Obituary.

Almina Hoag was born in Macedon, Wayne county, New York, March 5, 1814. Departed this life August 11, 1903. She was married to Daniel St. John in 1831. To this union seven children were born, two sons and five daughters. Her first husband died in 1880. In 1882 she was married to Joseph Sage, who died in 1890. Her parents were strict Quakers and all her life she was taught the Bible. At the age of eight she united with the Friends and started in the Christian life, telling her mother she wanted to be a good girl. At the age of fifteen she attended a despised Methodist meeting where she became wonderfully awakened about her soul, yet knowing the prejudice there was by her parents toward the Methodist, she resolved to go to the mourners bench and did so, but finding no peace she started home with her older brother and young friends who did not approve of her going to the altar of prayer. She prayed God to give her grace and strength to go in her home and tell her mother she had found Jesus and then in her brothers wagon along the road "A great light shone in her soul. Such a flood of joy came to her heart no human tongue could tell." She hastened on to her home and entered with her young friends. Her mother was sitting reading the Bible, she approached her mother and said: "O mother I have found Jesus." Mother arose and said: "Let us pray." "I was too happy to eat or sleep for days." She united with the Methodist church and has ever remained in this church always satisfied and with great faith in God. She was baptized in 1852 by Dr. Doane, 23 years after being converted, at a camp meeting held at South Yamhill, Oregon. She was one of nine children, three boys and six girls, all devout christians. Her own children are all christians walking in the way of their mother. She often said she had to have her religion, she could not get along with out it. Her lot was not always cast in pleasant places. She was an old pioneer landmarker, moving from place to place. Using her own expression, "I have been from sea to sea and there abouts." She helped to civilize the people and everyone she came in contact with felt the weight of her Christian experience, even the dumb savage. She was often thrown among the Indians in the days when the paleface was hated and many were cruelly slaughtered by those savage demons. With her kindness and implicit faith in God, she and her's were spared. Once when in Michigan, she with her helpless babes were alone and three hundred savages surrounded the house with burning fire-brands they entered the house, and she fell on her knees with her babes by her side and prayed to God for protection, and the chief told the Indians to go away and he returned and reached out his hands to her saying, "White man's God! White man's God." She said her room was full of holy Angels instead of Indians. Her whole life was fraught with remarkable instances—if all were written they would make an interesting book. (I wish I owned one.—Hokomb.) She delighted to talk on religion, frequently saying: "Happy as a clam." She often spoke of her children being so kind to her and rejoiced that they were all on their way to Heaven. Her home was the pioneer preacher's home. How her countenance would lighten up when the names of those old pioneer preachers were mentioned. She loved every body. The Christ-like spirit was hers. Her life was made up of kindness, praying, trusting and rejoicing occupied her mind. Heaven grew nearer and dearer until Jesus, the Great Shepherd of the sheep said: "Come up higher," and Mother Sage's happy spirit went out to be with God forever. Heaven is dearer to us all now because of these earthly ties, who are leaving us one by one and joining the innumerable throng who have washed their robes and are singing before the throne: "Glory and honor be unto Him who hath redeemed us and washed us in his own precious blood."
