Arrested for Larceny.

James Clayton, a well known town loafer, without any visible means of support, was arrested on the 20th by officer Goodman for pilfering money from the clothes of A. G. The brutal debauch of noise and stench and fire and death is over. At least we may hope it will not be prolonged greatly into this traditional day of rest and peace.
