The Shipping of the World.

Some curious facts regarding the shipping of the world are presented by the figures in Lloyd's Register for the current year. The merchant marine is something concerning which theories are many and theorists multitudinous. But Lloyd's deals only in figures. Many Americans have come to believe that we have no mercantile marine worth speaking about, whereas the Register shows that we rank second among the nations of the world in that respect, being exceeded only by Great Britain and her dependencies.

The red flag of Britain floats over nearly one-half the merchant tonnage of the world, but we come next, and after us Germany, Norway, France, and Italy, in the order named. That Norway with her small trade and only about 2,000,000 of population, should surpass in the amount of her merchant tonnage France, with her great trade and 4,600,000 of inhabitants, or even Italy, with her aggregate of imports and exports vast as compared with the Scandinavian country and with thirty-odd millions of inhabitants, is a truly remarkable fact, and shows the influence of heredity in this branch of the hardy Norse race. Ole Oleson finds his home as naturally today in the forecastle of the peaceful Fram as his viking ancestor, Olaf, of the Red Hand, found his beneath the dragon bulwarks of the Long Dragon a thousand years ago. A comparison of the shipping of Norway with that of France and of Italy shows that after all it is the maritime spirit of a nation and not government subsidies which most successfully creates a great merchant marine.

Of our own tonnage 3,611,530 tons, only 873,000 tons are registered for foreign commerce. But this will be remedied when Americans return to the element which they forsook for a time to people a continent and build a nation. How steam still goes on crowding out sail as a motive power is shown by the fact that three fifths of the vessels of the world today are steamers and while in the last year the total tonnage of the world increased 204,368 tons, not enough wind-blown ships being built to compensate for the loss by wreck-age and decay. The figures also show that while Great Britain and her dependencies have less than half the total tonnage of the world, they fly the red flag over 1,000,000 more tons propelled by steam than all the other nations of the world put together.

The State Fair.

No time in the history of the Oregon state fair has there been such a good feeling among the agricultural classes towards the success of the fair as exists at the present time. Every section of the state seems to be taking an interest in the fair and promises to give it their hearty support. Eastern Oregon for the first time has promised one or two county exhibits, consisting of agricultural products, while the southern portion of the state will also be represented by a comprehensive exhibit of its agricultural products. Live stock from all over the state is being prepared for this year's fair.

There are reasons for this awakening of the people to the support of the fair. One is, the management has worked hard and faithfully to make the fair as broad as the state itself. The transportation companies have come to their assistance and made very liberal rates on hauling exhibits of all kinds. Another is, the people are beginning to realize that it is time to let the outside world know of the wonderful resources of our state, and believe that the state fair is the proper place to meet the better class of home-seekers. This will make the fair double value. It will give those who are looking for homes on the Pacific coast an opportunity to see in a body what our state can produce and where it is produced, without traveling all over the state at great expense. It will also give the exhibitor the best possible opportunity of showing his products whether it be grains, grasses, fruits vegetables or live stock.
