Gravelford Academy Items.

School opens next Monday, fair attendance is expected at the first.

We shall have students from Coos, Douglas and Curry counties.

Encouraging letters are received from parents saying that they want their children in a school where the surrounding influences are elevating.

As the character of a government is known by its laws, so the standard of school may be known by its principles. The following are some of the principles upon which the Gravelford Academy is established:

Thoroughness. The mastery of principles and not the cramming of facts. No lesson will be considered learned until the student recognizes the principle under lying the lesson, and can illustrate that principle with examples of his own. Facts will be studied, but in their proper relations to principle.

No cramming for examinations in order to pass grades will be allowed. Examinations will be used sparingly; their place will be taken by frequent thorough written reviews.

Students will not be required nor permitted to take all the studies in their respective grades. The number of branches any student may pursue is limited to six.

Students who are backward in some studies can take just such a course as will enable them to build upon weak points. They will not be humiliated by being placed in classes with young children, but will be classified by themselves, or be given private instruction.

While now but competent, practical teachers are employed, the school is not established on teachers but on sound principles.

The social welfare of the students is well looked after. Wholesome literary work will be provided but all attempts to spend such time foolishly will be avoided. The school will be regarded much as a large family, and the ladies and gentlemen students are expected to properly relate themselves to it. Nothing in the line of flirtation or coquetry will be expected. Gentlemen will not escort ladies to and from public gatherings. Such things are proper enough at the right time and place, but not in school. School days are the time for the improvement of mind, morals, and physical powers.
