A New Steamer.

Captain Jensen informed our reporter that this trip is his last on the Steamer Chico, as he will stop in San Francisco, when he returns to the city, to watch the finishing and rigging of the new vessel that is being built for the Coquille trade and of which he will have charge when she goes into commission.

The new vessel is to have a length over all of about 155 feet, 35 feet beam, and 10 feet depth of hold, and a lumber carrying capacity of 350 M. feet. She will be fitted up with the latest improvements, will have electric lights and is expected to have a speed of about 10 knots, and will have accommodations for about 35 passengers.

The ship is well under way of construction, and Captain Jensen expects that she will be ready to put on the route in about two months. The new vessel is not intended to displace the Chico, but is to add another steamer to the Coquille trade, thus affording the river and valley still better shipping facilities.

The Coquille Valley has wonderful resources in timber, coal, dairy products, stock, fruit, and other farm produce, and greater developments are sure to come.

Captain Martin is with the steamer Chico this trip, and will take charge of her as master after she returns to San Francisco.—Recorder.
