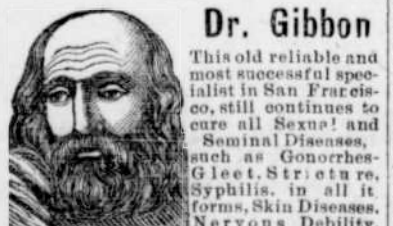

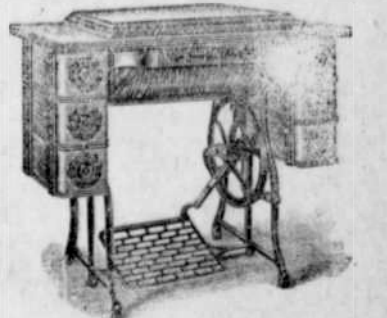

Narrow Escape From Drowning.

George Cook, son of Dr. Cook, of Empire, came very near finding a watery grave Tuesday night. He was only saved by the diligent search of the Life-Saving crew, who promptly went to the rescue at the call for help from Captain Rooke of the Blanco.

Mr. Cook and family had been camping and he had returned to Empire with his family which he landed safely and he was returning to the Life-Saving station for another load. The sea was running very high and his yard dipped into one of the waves, which upset the boat. Mr. Cook immediately began to call for help, which was heard by Captain Rooke and Mr. Cook's brother Lee, who were at the wharf in Empire. The Blanco immediately notified the Life-Saving crew. It being then 6:30 and quite dark and somewhat thick. The Lifeboat was immediately launched and search began, the crew constantly keeping up a call. The first sign of him was seen at 9:30. He was clinging to the bottom of his boat. When called he could not respond being too far gone to reply and had become deaf. He had to be shaken to arouse him. He was so benumbed that the crew were obliged to literally carry him to the station from the lifeboat. He was rubbed and given hot drinks and rolled in woolen blankets and put to bed. Wednesday morning he was returned to Empire safe and sound.

When the craft was capsized it was bearing food and otherwise the craft would probably have drifted to sea. Where the boat was

found it was a mass of sea weeds and not very far from land. It would have been next to impossible to get ashore.
Had the station been in telephone connection with Empire it would have been possible for the Life-Saving crew to have found the unfortunate man sooner. It would have been able to get to the locality before it got so densely dark.—Daily Coast Mail.

New York Milk Regulations.

In order to secure certification of his milk by the milk commission of New York city, the dairyman must have a clean cement floor stable, with whitewashed walls and abundant windows. Cows must be sponged and their tails scrubbed before each milking, white suits must be worn by attendants, bottles and utensils scalded and filled bottles kept on ice and shipped only in refrigerator cars.

EDITOR HERALD:
After so long a time I will write you. God bless you and yours, with all our dear friends at Coquille. Well, we had a humpy-bumpy time from Myrtle Point to Roseburg. We were in the stage fourteen hours, and traveled not only to all points of the compass, but also up and down. Saturday night we arrived at Aurora, about 6 o'clock, and then went to my brothers, two miles north of Aurora where I met my only sister and her husband. Next day I went five miles for another brother, and we had a family reunion which had not occurred before in thirty-three years, there being only four of us left of eight children that came to this coast in fifty-one and two. The reunion was at my oldest brother's home, who was eighty years old the 23rd of September, last; the next is 74, and the next 69, and myself 65. Since last February the ages of us four added together amounts to 287 years.

We have bought four acres of a prune orchard and have a shop built 12x16. We like our new home, it is just out side of town; right on the road which has the most travel of any road leading to this place.

I met Mr. Rich, Bird Nosler and several others from Coos. Mr. Rich has a very good trade. Some things are higher here than at Coquille, while others are lower. Well I have not received but one HERALD since I left Coquille. Wishing every one the good things of this life, and especially the things that pertaineth to eternal life, I will say goodbye.
