Another Letter From Fred Kerrigan.

The following is an excerpt taken from a letter from Fred Kerrigan to his father at this place. The letter was mailed by C. R. Phillips in New York City, October 21, and it is more than likely that Mr. Phillips will be back here before this reaches our readers.

Buenos Ayres, Sept. 23, 1903

DEAR FATHER: I will write you a short letter. Charlie and several boys from the United States are going home tomorrow and you bet I wish that I were going with them, as this is a fearful place to stay and you can never hear a good word about the country. They all say it is very bad and that it is very unhealthy, which I know to be true here, as there are all kinds of chills and fever here, and some contagious diseases, too. But I do not intend to come home without seeing part of the country anyway, as that was what I left home for and what you expect me to do.

I start Friday morning, Sept. 25, for the country south of Buenos Ayres. Mr. Kribs is going with me. We will take a saddle horse apiece and one pack horse. We will go as far as — on the train and there get our horses. It is all of 900 miles to ride on horseback and if we do not like the country we will have to ride it back again—then we hit for the UNITED STATES.

It is very cold where we are going. It freezes the sheepskins, wool-side-down, to the rocks and the ground every night in the hottest part of the Summer; but the days are tolerably warm. Yet you can guess about how hot the days are when it freezes every night in the Summer. They say cattle can live there and that is the only place I know where a person can get any land at all, and then he has to either buy those infernal Chilianos off or run them off, and that is rather bad business as they do not like to leave and a person has to force them as they will not sell for anything reasonable and to buy land where it is worth anything or where it is settled, would take more money than there is in the United States.

I expect that we are very foolish to go down in that country. At least everyone who has gone near that country and got back alive, says so. But we will see, anyway. We may not be back for Christmas or New Years.

Every day, there are hundreds of people leaving and nearly as many coming. They are all fooled about the country. They come, thinking they can, at least get work; but they cannot, as there are hundreds of Italians leaving on every boat, and they work for nothing, or very close to it. They get from 30 to 50 centavos a day—nearly 15 and 25 cents. They get a small loaf of bread and a little meat in the morning and that does them all day long, and these cost them 10 centavos. So you can form some idea of the way they live and the wages they receive.

The Chubut country that is "blowed up" so high, is nothing but a barren waste of sand, and the wind blows so hard all day that a horse cannot stand up against it and the sand cuts a person all to pieces in just a little while and they have to bore from 1500 to 1800 meters to strike water, and only ground water at that. There are no artesian wells in this country yet.

I am going to send this letter by Charlie as far as New York and he will mail it there.

It costs so much for a ticket here and then you have to have American money changed to this damned Argentine money before you can buy your ticket, and they discount it so much.

Mr. Kribs does not intend to go back to Coquille, but to Portland, he thinks.

Charlie will tell you all about the country and the money business when he gets there. I cannot write it as it would take too many tablets. Write in care of George Newberry, Vice Consul, and he will see that we get it, as we will keep him posted as to where we are; and he has power of attorney so that if we strike anything we can telegraph him and he will look out for our interests.

It is getting dark and we have nothing but candles for light. Good bye, with love. FRED.
