Is Life Worth Living?

Part First.
The life which we live has its manifold amara. Its full cup of pleasure, its burden of care; its light and its shadows, its sun and its showers. Commingle to fashion the life which is ours.

Is life worth living? I asked of a child Whom earth has not stained or years yet defiled. Whose infantile sweetness of lip and of face Was the badge of the innocence time would efface.
Each gesture complete as he speeds o'er the lawn, His steps are as free as the feet-footed fawn. On its green native heath he gathers as free, From the blossoms around as the provident bee.
Yet lays by no store for the winter—his life Is a cauldron of pleasure—the joys that are rife Ever bubble and rise till the fountain o'er flows With music and laughter where ever he goes. And this beautiful child in his dance and his song Danced into my heart as he danced thro' the throng, When I queried "Is life worth the living?"

The ready reply Was caught from the flash of his radiant eye As swiftly he answered, then fitted away— "Life is worth living—for living is play."

In its object of gaining political separation from Columbia, the Panama revolution was a complete success, but before long the Panamanians will realize that the same conditions which assure the success of the revolution will place the so-called independent state of Panama in absolute dependence on the United States, which will guarantee not only the existence of the small republic, but its internal peace as well. The infant state owes its existence to the right and duty of the United States to preserve peace on the Isthmus, and this duty in force. Our treaty rights and obligations of 1846 no longer apply to New Grand or to Columbia, but are transferred to Panama; and while the treaty gives practically sovereignty powers over but a limited territory of the two former states, it applies to about all the territory of Panama. The same right which justified us in keeping Colombian troops from the Isthmus, obliges us to prevent any internal disorders in the new republic. Panama may remain independent in name but the greater part of her territory will come under control of the United States. We shall establish a kind protectorate over the small state, and American troops and warships will be ever ready to preserve peace on the isthmus. Unless the Panamanians mend their ways and refrain from revolutions, the very marines whom they are now cheering as allies will be forced to place the country in such a manner as to destroy every vestige of Panama's sovereignty. This anomalous situation may end by the Isthmus applying for annexation to the United States, with a status similar to that of Hawaii or Porto Rico, and finally it may be admitted as a state. But, however, this may be, by separating from Columbia and placing herself under the protection of the United States, Panama has forever made her independence a mere name. We shall protect her against aggression, and treat her justly but we shall also expect her to live up to her obligations. There is now no doubt that a canal treaty will soon be negotiated with the young republic, and the construction of the great waterway soon begun by this country. At present over 100,000 persons cross the Isthmus every year by the railroad and more than a million tons of merchandise are transported by the same route. This gives but a faint idea of the importance of the canal and when it is once completed the commercial interest of the world will no doubt rejoice that the canal site came under the control of the United States. In a few years, present events in Panama will be regarded as important history.

Battle over Minn9 Claims.

Denver, Colo., Dec. 4.—A special to the News from Rincon, N. M., says three men badly wounded were brought to Rincon today from the new gold fields at Apache Canyon for treatment. They had been shot in conflicts over claims. It is reported several other men have been shot. No names are given. A mining expert, who returned from the new gold district today, reports that the field is very rich. There are now 2500 men on the ground, and more arriving daily.

Extra Session merges into Regular.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The House adjourned at 1:40 P. M. today without any qualified time. This carries the House over until 12 o'clock Monday, and I will have the effect of merging the extra session into the regular session without interim. The result will be to cause the lapse of the nomination of General Wood and 167 other nominations.

Men Must do Best, He Says.

New York, Nov. 30.—In a sermon on "Women," Rev. Dr. N. D. Hillis has sounded a warning note to young men in business life.

"If you don't want women to outstrip you in the industrial race," he said, "and compel you to come to them when you want 50 cents, you would better stop drinking poor whisky and quit gambling at race tracks and in pool rooms. Women, in spite of man's refusal to give them the rights and privileges to which they are entitled, are today in 145 branches of business, and in instances showing more ability than the men."
"In one of the greatest financial institutions of this city not long ago a well-known man, drawing a salary of \$25,000 a year, suffered a nervous collapse. The directors selected the young woman who for ten years had been the stenographer. She, the directors told me, had done better work than the man she succeeded, and is doing it for \$10,000 a year."
"In 50 years the women will know more than the men. They have more time to read and study and they are improving their time. Eventually they will vote and tell the men for whom they shall vote."
"Eventually all the universities will be co-educational, and the women will carry off all the prizes."

Santa Fe Coming This Way.

San Francisco, Dec. 4.—The Santa Fe railroad has acquired the North Shore railroad and is taking tremendous steps in the proposed plan of fighting the Southern Pacific on this coast.
The North Shore Road operates from San Francisco by boat across the bay, thence along the coast northward to Casadero, a distance of 90 miles.
The Santa Fe is at present building from Eureka southward to connect with the North Shore at Casadero. This is a move for a through line up the state within a hundred miles of the Oregon border. Those well informed assert that the Santa Fe's next step will be an extension into Oregon. The Santa Fe has long been anxious to reach Portland.

Nineteen Lives Lost This Season.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—The Tribune today says: Nineteen lives were lost on the football gridiron during the season of 1903.
One boy was driven insane from injuries.
Thirteen players were severely injured, some of them being disabled for life.
The number of minor but painful accidents goes into the hundreds and the list of the severely injured necessarily also is incomplete. The feature of the year's tabulation is that shows serious casualties were confined to untrained players. No member of any of the first-class elevens was killed or permanently disabled. One Yale player and one Harvard player suffered a broken leg each.

No player in any of the teams of the "Big Nine" colleges in the West was the victim of any hurt worse than a wrenched shoulder, a bruised head, a sprained knee or a torn ankle. In consequence of the injuries sustained by their players, several of the minor schools have forbidden the game of football.
Six Hundred Chinese Leave San Francisco.
San Francisco, Dec. 3.—Six hundred Chinese in round numbers sailed yesterday afternoon in the China Commercial Company's freight steamer Lothian for Hong Kong, and their departure was not only an event of absorbing interest in the Chinese quarter of the city, but among the officials of the competing Oriental transportation lines.

Senator Hanna has succeeded Senator Morgan as chairman of the committee on Inter-oceanic Canals. Another victory for Panama.

The Police of Germany are looking for Princess Alice of Schoenburg Waldenburg who has eloped with her coachman. The Princess is a daughter of Don Carlos, the Spanish pretender.
Some of the western capitalists criticize the President as severely for dining with the mining labor leaders of Butte, Montana, as did the people of the south for his Booker Washington dinner.
China has recognized the republic of Panama. Perhaps the Chinese government will ask Panama for part of the \$10,000,000 as an indemnity for the two Chinamen who were killed in the revolution.

Farmers Joining Unions in Texas.
Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 3.—The farmers of Texas are being unionized at a rapid rate. There are today 3000 unions in Texas, with a total membership of 40,000 or more, and the organization is spreading like wildfire. It began at Emory, Raines county, about 10 months ago, under the name of the Farmers' Educational and Co-Operative Union of America, and is now established in nearly every populous county in Texas. About the middle of February next a meeting will be held for completing a state organization and it is believed the movement will spread to other states, as the Farmers' Alliance, which organized in Kansas did a few years ago.
The purpose of the union is to buy and sell in bulk, to educate along agricultural lines and to eschew politics, but nevertheless to discuss political economy.
