

Expenditures Oregon Waterways.

Dec. 7.—The Secretary of the Treasury today submitted to Congress the following estimates for appropriations for Oregon waterways in the next fiscal year:

Mouth of the Columbia River, \$500,000.

Columbia and Willamette Rivers below Portland, \$500,000.

Upper Willamette and Yamhill Rivers, \$90,000.

Columbia River between The Dalles and Celilo, \$300,000.

Columbia River at Cascades, \$90,000.

Coquille River, \$30,000.

Coos Bay, \$60,000.

Tillamook Bay, \$10,000.

More About Railroads.

Ogden, Utah, Dec. 10.—The Ogden & Northwestern railroad which is to be extended to Coos Bay, is owned principally by David H. H. Spencer and Thomas D. Dee. They are wealthy capitalists and own a controlling interest in the Amalgamated Sugar Company of Utah, having factories at Ogden and Logan. They are also the head of the Utah and Oregon Lumber Company with headquarters at Baker City, and own the Sumpter Valley railroad.

Nine miles of the Ogden & Northwestern has already been built northwest of Ogden and it is in operation. Steel has been ordered for 11 miles more, which takes it to Brigham City in the center of the Bear river valley in Utah.

The first 150 miles of the road will tap a rich agricultural district, the principal product of which is sugar beets.

The road is designated to form an outlet for the timber districts of Oregon, both east and west.

The men behind it have millions available themselves, and being connected with the sugar magnates of the East are in a situation to command their united capital. It is thought that there are negotiations now on foot between these men and the projectors of the proposed Coos Bay road, but the Ogden men decline to be interviewed.

It was first thought that the road would eventually become a part of the Western Pacific coming from San Francisco through Beckwith pass, as Mr. Eccles and his associates own large tracts of timber land in California traversed by the roads, and he made a trip to San Francisco some months ago and met the promoters of that line; but it is now practically admitted that a Coos Bay road is being planned.

At this point the road forms a junction with the Rio Grande Western, San Pedro, Oregon Short Line, Union and Southern Pacific.

Mysterious Metal which Bears Light.

San Francisco, Dec. 11.—The state mineral bureau reports the discovery of the new and mysterious metal in a mine in Mariposa county. The metal carries a good percentage of gold and antimony and traces of copper. When scratched it sparkles and shines. It is soft and cuts away with a knife. If scratched with the finger nail sparks are emitted the same as if flint was struck with a piece of metal.

The women of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, the Dakotas, in fact, the women of all the Rocky mountain and Pacific country have taken up the project of erecting a statue to the memory of Sacajawea, the Indian girl guide and interpreter who made it possible for the Lewis and Clark expedition to reach the Pacific coast, and a western sculptor, Miss Alice Cooper, of Denver, has been selected to execute the memorial. This will be not only the first statue ever erected to an Indian woman, but a type of the new recognition that has come to the civilized red man of today. In the light of the setting sun let Sacajawea stand, glorified.

The Washington typewriter girls and stenographers are being organized into a union by the American Federation of Labor. The young women, who take dictation, will soon be dictating shorter hours and higher wages to their employers.

The new three inch field gun about to be adopted by the American artillery is said to be equal to, if not better than, that of any other nation. It might be well for General Reyes of Columbia to take notice of this fact.

The Panama commissioners have just sailed for home. As the canal treaty was signed several hours before they arrived in Washington, they must feel that their trip was not very necessary.

It appears that the lad, whose name was Warrie Metcalf, and who was about 13 years old, had taken some logs up to the mill, the preceding day, and was going back to get his pay, and finding the current too strong for him to pull up against, he got out of his boat on to the boom, and was pulling his boat along having hold upon the boat's painter. While making his way along the boom in this manner, he slipped and fell into the river, and being unable to swim, was drowned.

His mother witnessed his mishap, but was unable to reach him. His grandparents were crossing the river at some distance away, and saw him fall into the water but could not reach the place in time to render any assistance.

The funeral took place Tuesday, at noon, in the Bandon cemetery.—Recorder.
