Oregon Indian War Veterans Aided.

Washington, Dec. 1.—Senator John H. Mitchell today introduced bills appropriating \$100,000 for a federal building at Baker City, and granting an increase of pensions to all soldiers and widows of the Indian wars of Oregon to \$12 monthly and for amending the revised statutes so that surviving persons who served in Indian and other wars prior to 1861 shall receive warrants for 160 acres of land each and persons designated who may have received warrants for less than 160 acres shall be allowed warrants for a number of acres more to make a total of 160.

Refused to Marry Divorced Persons.

New York, Dec. 4.—Opposition by ministers here toward solemnizing the marriage of divorced persons is becoming so marked that the Protestant Episcopal church's committee on the subject is receiving assurances of co-operation from other denominations. Support to the movement, which is an outgrowth of action taken by the last general convention, already has been pledged by a meeting at which there will be delegates representing the Presbyterian, Baptist, United Presbyterian, Unitarian, Congregational and Lutheran churches. Invitations have been sent to the Universalists, United Brethren and other religious bodies to join in the crusade, and it is expected that at the next meeting of the promoters, to be held in February, at least 20 denominations will be represented, so that divorces may have to face a serious problem if they wish to remarry under church rites in this city.

Dowie To Sail for Australia.

Vancouver, B. C., Dec. 5.—That John Alexander Dowie expects matters in Zion City will quickly right themselves is shown by his decision to keep to the arrangements for his Australia tour. Elijah II will arrive here on January 5, and will sail for Sydney on the Mowers on January 8. There has been some uncertainty as to whether Dowie would travel by way of San Francisco, but he has now finally decided to sail from Vancouver. This is in accordance with his projected tour of the world. He will meet his wife and son at Adelaide, whither they are now proceeding via the Red Sea.

Miners Drink Less

Pottsville, Pa., Dec. 7.—As a result of the increase of temperance sentiment among the anthracite miners, nearly one-third of the 1100 saloon-keepers of Schuylkill county will go out of business next year. This is shown by the decreased number of applicants for licenses.

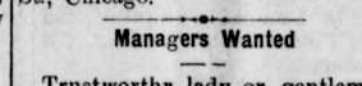
