Geo. Francis Train Dead.

New York, Jan. 18.—George Francis Train died tonight from heart disease at Mills Hotel No. 1, where he has lived for some years. The fatal stroke followed an attack of acute nephritis.

George Francis Train was born in Boston March 24, 1829. He was orphaned in 1833, his parents and three sisters dying of the yellow fever at New Orleans. He went north alone at once to his grandmother atatham, Mass. He was successively farmer boy, grocer clerk, shipping clerk, and became a partner in a grocery at 20. In 1850 he established a branch in Liverpool. He established the firm of Train & Co., at Melbourne, Australia, in 1853, and started the first line of clippers to California. He promoted the building of the great Atlantic & eastern Railroad, 1858, and the first street railways in Europe, 1860-2. He made an independent race for President of the United States in 1872. He made three trips around the world, and became famed as a lecturer and promoter. He wrote several books.

Teachers' Examination.

The regular examination of applicants for State and County certificates will be held in my office in Coquille, beginning at 9 a. m. Feb. 10th 1904 and continuing three days.

All persons holding State Diplomas under the old law are now entitled to State Life Diplomas by passing successfully at a regular examination in Algebra, English Literature, Oregon School Law and General History and paying a fee of \$10. W. H. Busch, County Supt. Dated this 25th day of Jan. 1904.
