Council Proceedings.

The Council met in regular session February 1, 1904, at 7:45 P. M., with all members present. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Regular monthly reports of the treasurer, recorder and marshal for the month of January were read and referred to the finance committee.

The chairman of the finance committee reported that the committee had examined the reports of the treasurer, recorder and marshal for the months of November and December, 1903, and found them correct; and, on motion, the report was accepted.

The city treasurer appeared and presented \$6,000 old bonds, which had been retired by the issue of October, 1903, and \$9,000 more of the same edition which had never been hypothecated, making \$15,000, being all of the old issue; and, upon motion, the same were ordered destroyed.

In the matter of sinking or reserve fund for the payment of accruing interest upon city water loan bonds, the city treasurer was directed to set aside \$300 from funds now on hand and \$150 from February receipts and \$150 from March receipts, current year, to pay same.

The following ordinance relative to recorder's court proceedings was read and adopted by unanimous vote of the council:

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE PAYMENT OF COSTS BY PRIVATE PROSECUTORS IN CERTAIN CASES:

The people of the City of Coquille do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1.—That the name of every person who voluntarily appears before the Recorder of this city to prosecute any person in a criminal action, either for a misdemeanor or a felony, whether the same be for the violation of the laws of the state of Oregon or of any ordinance of this city, shall be endorsed upon the complaint, information or indictment as private prosecutor; and if it shall be found by the Recorder, on the trial of said action or hearing said proceeding that the prosecution is malicious or without probable cause, said fact shall be entered upon record in said action or proceeding by the Recorder.

SEC. 2.—That the Recorder, before issuing a warrant or any process at the request of such private prosecutor as in Section 1 of this ordinance mentioned, may, at his option, require of such private prosecutor a good and sufficient undertaking, with one or more sureties, conditioned that, in case said action or proceeding shall prove to be malicious or without probable cause, said private prosecutor, or his sureties, shall pay all costs and disbursements of such action or proceeding.

SEC. 3.—Upon making the entry upon the record as required by Section 1 of this ordinance, the Recorder must immediately render judgment against such private prosecutor and against his bondsmen for the costs and disbursements of the action or proceeding, which judgment may be enforced by execution in the same manner as a judgment in a civil action.

Adopted by the Common Council February 1st, 1903.

The recorder was instructed to see if the Pacific Coast Pipe Co. would take back some extra castings, etc., not needed, and give credit for the same.

On motion, the Council adjourned to February 15.
