Council Proceedings.

The council met in regular session Monday night with all members present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Monthly reports of Recorder, treasurer and marshal were read and referred to finance committee.

Petition was received from property owners on Second street to have said street graded and paved, and cement sidewalk laid on each side of street from Hall street to C street. Petition was granted and matter referred to ordinance committee.

Petition from A. H. Mulkey, asking to be relieved from payment of water rate on amount supplied to the Academy building, was granted so long as building is used only for school purposes.

Saloon license granted to Baxter Bros., for period of six months, to date from March 16, 1904.

Bill of Coquille River Electric Company referred back for correction.

An ordinance was passed to prohibit any person or persons, except employees on such trains, from getting on or off of any railroad train while in motion within the corporate limits.

Another ordinance was passed prohibiting all persons under the age of 18 years from being on the streets within this corporation after 8 o'clock P. M. in the winter and 9 o'clock P. M. in summer.

AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE FOR THE SUPPRESSING AND PROHIBITING OF GAMBLING AND GAMBLING HOUSES WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF COQUILLE.

The People of the City of Coquille do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to deal, play, carry on, open or cause to be opened or conducted, either as owner or employee whether for hire or not, or play or bet at, in or against any game of faro, monte, roulette, rouge-et-noir, la-quequet, rondo, vigt-un (or twenty-one) poker, draw-poker, bragg, bluff, thaw, or any banking or any other game played with cards, dice, or any other device, whether the same be played for money, checks, credits, or any other

representative of value, within the limits of the City of Coquille.

SEC. 2. It shall be unlawful for any person to act as lookout, door-keeper or game-keeper for any game of faro, roulette, rouge-et-noir, la-quequet, rondo, vigt-un (or twenty-one), poker, draw-poker, bragg bluff, thaw, or any banking or any other game played with cards, dice, or any other device whether the same be for money, checks, credit, or any other representative of value, within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille.

SEC. 3. It shall be unlawful for any person to visit any room or rooms within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille, where any of the games mentioned and enumerated in Sections 1 and 2 are being played, conducted or carried on, for money, checks, credit or any other representative of value.

SEC. 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to keep or exhibit any gambling table, device or apparatus, or conduct, keep or carry on any gambling establishment, or any room or place for the practice of gambling or playing games of chance for money or other representative of value, with cards, dice or other device, within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille.

SEC. 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to suffer or permit any of the acts or things forbidden by or made punishable by this ordinance to be done or carried on in any house, room, or shop, or other building whatsoever, or any boat, booth, garden, or other place of which he is in possession or is the owner, or to the possession of which he is entitled, within the corporate limits of the City of Coquille.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the police, including city marshal, night watchman, and all officers especially or temporarily appointed to perform the duties of these officers, of the City of Coquille to seize and safely keep all chips, checks, cards, dice, boxes, tables, boards and all other articles used or pertaining to the games mentioned and set forth in Sections 1 and 2, and to produce the same in court, and to be retained until final disposition of any case in which said articles may be required as evidence, to be then destroyed by order of the Recorder before whom such case is heard.

SEC. 7. It shall be the special duty of each city attorney, city marshal, city night watchman, and all other city peace officers, including all officers especially or temporarily appointed to perform the duties of these officers, to inform against and diligently prosecute any and all persons whom they shall have reasonable cause to believe guilty of a violation of the provisions of this ordinance.

SEC. 8. Any officer named in the preceding section who shall refuse or willfully neglect to inform against and prosecute offenders against this ordinance shall also be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, shall be punished as hereinafter provided, and in addition to the penalty herein provided for the Recorder's court before which such officer shall be tried, shall declare the office or appointment held by such officer vacant for the balance of the term.

SEC. 9. Any person or persons who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof before the Recorder's court, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Twenty-five dollars nor more than One Hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the city jail not to

exceed fifty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

The foregoing ordinance was duly adopted by the Common Council of the City of Coquille on the 7th day of March, 1904.

Council adjourned 'till March 14, 1904.

## Isthmian Prospects.

Although Colombia and the newly formed Republic of Panama have made considerable noise in the world of late, intrinsically, under whatever names the fortunes of revolution have designated, they have so far counted for little in the world's practical affairs. Mainly from a physical point of view there is much good reason for this, and now from changed political fortunes there is equally good promise of a marvelous change for the better.

From topographical causes, without doubt the Isthmus of Panama is one of the most undesirable places to live on the face of the globe; and except that it offers facilities for the close linking of the commercial interests of two hemispheres it is a fair assumption that its changing autonomy would be of comparatively slight interest to civilized nations at the present time. Nature reveals in such strength of exuberance on this narrow strip of land which connects the two Western continents that civilization finds no adequate reward along the lines of usual extension. Opportunities for intensive effort in agriculture, commerce or manufacture are almost entirely lacking or are largely negated by prevailing physical conditions, which encourage the most virulent diseases that plague mankind. Smallpox, malignant malaria, yellow fever,—these are all common, with the appearance now and again of diseases peculiar to Asiatic peoples, as the bubonic plague, leprosy and cholera.

These facts have given to the Isthmus and adjacent territory an immigrant population peculiar unto itself. Underlying all civilized progress thus far in this region is the element of adventure dependent upon variant political fortunes, and the efficacy of scheme and intrigue, rather than legitimate industrial and commercial pursuits. Private ambition has been the dominant force behind every movement of a political character, and wherever men have been gathered together in considerable communities, absence of public spirit has made this unhealthy and undesirable region even more irksome as an abiding place. In either of the cities of consequence, abominable sanitation adds to the moral effectiveness of prevailing disease.

As affairs have now shaped, there is every assurance that a wonderful change is about to be wrought. The building of the Isthmian waterway through American agency will, as in Cuba and the Philippines, create an American atmosphere. There will follow knowledge of the American method of doing things, and appreciation of the benefits that will accrue therefrom. There was something done by the Frenchman when he was digging the inter-oceanic ditch. Hospitals were erected for the exclusive treatment of the laborers in the employ of the French company, but with these came extensive graveyards. The world is familiar with the assertion that the Panama railroad cost a human life for every tie, but it is safe to say that in the canal work now in contemplation American intelligence will avoid such fearful mortality. Admiral Walker, president of the Canal Commission, has given assurance but recently on that score.

With the inauguration of canal construction, the people of the Isthmus should realize the dawning of a new era in all matters that pertain to the political and material welfare of that region. Except for Colombia, temporarily in the sulks, there is, without doubt, appreciation that their future is largely within the direction of their great North American neighbor, and that their faces are finally turned from the night of wretchedness and misrule to the dawning promise of modern achievement, through honesty, thrift and enterprise.—Evening Telegram.

## America's Oldest Citizen is Dead.

New Brunswick, N. J., March 2.—Noah Raby, said to be the oldest person in America, died today at the poorhouse of Piscataway county, aged 132 years. For more than 30 years he made his home in the poorhouse, and for the last few years he was totally blind, although otherwise in the full possession of his faculties.

It was his boast that he had been a smoker for more than 120 years, and had used liquor until he was forced to give it up on entering the poorhouse.

Old residents claim that "Uncle Raby's" age is well authenticated. He was born at Gates, N. C., April 1, 1772. His mother was white and his father was an Indian. The old man took a great interest in politics, but had not voted for years, because he could not pay his poll tax.
