

Ready to Accept Mediation of Hague Tribunal.

London, March 8.—Every indication is that the Czar is ready to retire gracefully from the field should the opportunity offer. High legation officers have been in receipt of information within the last 24 hours that enable them to, should they feel disposed, act in the interests of peace and be confident that Russia will not object. The Czar is said to have intimated to St. Petersburg authorities that he would welcome European mediation and this has been transmitted to the representatives here who have conveyed the news to the representatives of leading nations most directly interested. The Czar favors arbitration and is said to be willing to refer the entire matter to the Hague tribunal and to hold up hostilities pending a settlement.

Russia, so military experts say, has found that she is in no trim for war in the far east. She had her ships hemmed in by a superior force, her bases of supplies and even her coal stations are not accessible to her cruiser fleet and the squadrons at Port Arthur and Vladivostok are bottled up most tightly. The railroad that was to prove such a boon in wartime has proven anything but a blessing, and as a tool it is a dull one. Transportation of troops goes on slowly, on sea the Russian is impotent and on land protection is all that can be hoped for, no conquest can be made and protection of acquired territory is even questionable in many cases.

In short, the Russian leaders feel, according to well authenticated dispatches, that the Hague could not deprive them of more than they are liable to lose if the war continues and that at a much less cost. Just what nation, if any, will intercede on Russia's behalf is uncertain and whether such intercession would be acceptable to Japan, or if not, whether Europe would back any attempt to coerce the Japs to quit, pending negotiations, is uncertain. But for the first time Russia has weakened and boasts are by no means so loud as they were during the first days of the war.

At the same time no diplomat seriously believes the Russian Czar or his officials will give up the fight until they have Manchuria, but they are willing to cease hostilities until they can better meet the inroads of the persistent Japs.

While mediation is being considered by the czar and some of the high officials other who represented the military arm exclusively are just as firm as ever for war to the end. A leading Russian official at St. Petersburg in an interview today stated that reports of mediation were absurd and would continue to be so until the Russian army and navy had by brilliant successes on land and sea retrieved reverses. He stated that the efforts of the army would be concentrated towards a sweeping land victory and that this was imperative to save the caste of the nation before the world.

It is gratifying to note that the class of immigrants now coming to this state is made up largely of men with families. The man who comes hither accompanied by his wife and children is more than likely to become a permanent citizen. If farmers, of whom, if thrifty and industrious, Oregon cannot have too many, they will promote neighborhood growth and neighborly feeling, increase the number of school houses and churches and add to the comfortable homes and well-to-do citizens of the state. If of the skilled laboring class, they will find their niche in the industrial life of the state, having in all probability as prudent men selected this in advance of their coming. If unskilled laborers, they will take their chance with those of their class, their employment and wages depending to a greater extent than is sometimes imagined upon their willingness, sobriety and capability. There is room and welcome for all except those who have come hither with the idea that a living can be made and a competence required without special effort. It is too much to expect that even the best of them will be set down among strangers thus early in the season and not feel a twinge of loneliness of homesickness. But a year in Oregon, with its contrasts in climate between Kansas, Nebraska or other sections of the rigorous Middle West, or farther East, will in a large majority of cases make of these thrifty immigrants contented, cheerful citizens. Oregon needs them, and we are firmly convinced that they need Oregon.—Oregonian.

Republicans demand that Postmaster-General Payne shall manage the coming campaign. Uncle Sam Involved.

Washington, March 8.—A carefully guarded secret was unearthed today by the state department when it was learned that four ships are to leave France for Brazil soon on a filibustering expedition. The object of the expedition is to get possession of the territory between the Araguany and Arepoe rivers, adjoining French Guiana, the ownership of which was in dispute between France and Brazil for years. In 1900 the territory was awarded to Brazil by the Swiss government, which had been agreed on as an arbitrator. French colonists living in the territory displayed much bitterness over the award and ever since then have been threatening revolt.

A Frenchman named Brezet, who formerly lived in French Guiana, proclaimed himself "president of the republic of Cumani," in Paris a few days ago. From this it is supposed that he is at the head of a filibustering movement and is working in harmony with dissatisfied colonists, who have established a paper public.

The state department is interested, because it may be called on to prevent European sovereignty over any additional territory in South America, as stipulated in the Monroe doctrine. To prevent, if possible, any such contingency Mr. Hay will inform the French government of the proposed expedition.

Leading Events of Fourth Week of the War

Mar. 1st, Japan makes formal denial of the charges made by Russia, that the former has violated the international law.

Mar. 2nd, 500 Manchurian bandits armed with modern rifles attack a Russian outpost near Sai Cheng.

Mar. 3rd, Vladivostok is isolated by destruction of the Siberian railway and severing of the telegraph lines by Japanese.

Mar. 4th, Russian engineers build many sidings along the Trans-Siberian railway, near the Lake Baikal, in order to relieve the congestion and permit the troops trains to proceed without interruption.

Mar. 5th, Russia gives a rush order to an American firm for apparatus for coaling ships at sea, used by American navy during the late Spanish war.

Mar. 6th, A Japanese squadron of seven ships consisting of one battleship, four armored cruisers and two protected cruisers bombard Vladivostok.

Mar. 7th, Russian Vladivostok squadron of four cruisers are cut off by the Japanese squadron, from their base of supply, and a battle is imminent.

Russia exiles to Siberia all the Japanese residents in Vladivostok, and Japan enters a strong protest.
