Pensions for Confederates

Among the bills passed by Con-
gress was one introduced by Sena-
tor Pritchard of North Carolina
providing that those Confederate
veterans who enlisted and served in
the Federal army prior to January
1, 1865, shall be eligible to receive
pensions from the government. By
the passage of this bill about \$3,000,
000 will be disbursed in North Car-
olina and Tennessee. There were
many Northern sympathizers who
were forced into the Confederate
ranks, but who afterward deserted
and joined the Union army. Another
clause in the bill provides that
where a soldier has deserted from
the United States army and has
subsequently re-enlisted and been
granted an honorable discharge, his
former desertion shall not militate
against his eligibility to receive a
pension. There were 107,000 desertions
during the civil war, and it is
estimated that this bill will add
\$1,000,000 yearly to the pension ac-
count.—The Columbian.

Salt Wells in Polk County.

Charles O'Brien, who owns a
farm near Monmouth, says the
neighborhood where he now lives
is excited over the salt well which
was recently dug on the Whiteaker
place. This well is on the same
farm as the one dug by Banker
Hirschberg, of Independence, and
gives promise of producing enough
salt of fine quality to supply the
entire state. The water in the well
has been analyzed and contains 75
percent of salt. Machinery for an
immense plant has been ordered for
some weeks and is expected to ar-
rive in the course of about two
weeks when the work of purifying
salt will commence.—Brownsville
Times.

ard Dixon, a negro, who fatally shot

men and shot to death in the jail-
yard. Later, the body was hung to
a telegraph pole at the corner of
Main street and Fountain avenue,
and the mob spent half an hour rid-
dling the body with bullets from
several hundred revolvers.

That vessels of the United States,
or belonging to the United States,
and no others, shall be employed
in the transportation by sea of coal,
provisions, fodder or supplies of
any description, purchased pursu-
ant to law for the use of the army
or navy, unless the President shall
find that the rates of freight
charges by said vessels are exces-
sive and unreasonable, in which
case contracts shall be made under
the law as it now exists; provided,
that no greater charges be made by
such vessels for transportation of
articles for the use of the said army
and navy than are made by such
vessels for transportation of like
goods for private parties or com-
panies. This act shall take effect
60 days after its passage.—Oregonian.
