The prohibition county convention for Coos county, Oregon, is hereby called to meet at Coquille, Coos county, Oregon, on the 22nd day of April, 1904, at 2 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of electing delegates to the state convention to be held at Portland, Oregon, on the 28th and 29th days of April, 1904; delegates to the First Congressional district convention of the State of Oregon; and for the nomination of candidates for state senator for Coos and Curry counties, representative for Coos county, county clerk, sheriff, two county commissioners, assessor, school superintendent, treasurer, surveyor, coroner and district officers as may be necessary, and such other business as may come before said convention.
