Washington, April 7.—The cenwhich gives the estimated popul-tion of the United States for 1903, exclusive of Alaska and the insular possession of the United States at, 79,900,389. This is an increase of 2, 059,014 since the ceusus of 2900. The population is estimated for 438 cities having 10,000 or more habitants in 1900. According to these estimates, New York is now a city of 3,716.139 inhabitants, Chicago has 1, 873,830; Philadelphia, 1,367,716. St. Louis has just passed, and Boston has almost reached the 600,000 mark. San Francisco and Pitsburg are close competitors, the former having 355,919 and the latter 345,043.
