Leading Events of Ninth Week of the War

April 5—New Chuang is declared by Russians under a martial law and the entrance to the harbor is mined.

April 6—General Kuropatkin reviews his troops in Manchuria and reports to the Czar that the men are in excellent condition.

April 7—Japanese outpost in Korea occupies Wi-Ju after a hot battle of short duration and practically drives out the last Russian soldiers from Korea.

April 8—Mme Ponep, a Russian woman of great beauty, is appointed by the Czar a lieutenant in the First Regiment of Cossack Rifles. Mme. Ponep is 33 years old, comes of the old warriors stock and said to be one of the best shots with rifle and revolver besides being an excellent horsewoman.

April 9—Russia completely evacuate Korea and the Japanese army begins its Northward movement across the Yalu River.

April 10—Japanese salvers succeed in raising the cruiser "Variat" sunk during the naval battle of March 9, in the Chemulpo harbor.

April 11—Japanese armored cruiser "Kasuga" sends out a party of five marines to reconnoiter the mouth of the Yalu. The party encounters a detachment of Cossacks and promptly opens a hot fire and kills two men and retires. This is the first appearance of the "Kasuga" since she left Genoa where she was built for Arsetine republic and sold to Japan before the hostilities commenced.
