giving some figures of the Novem-  
ber election. Their exactness is  
fairly startling. He tells almost all  
he knows about it.  
Joseph W. Folk, whom Democrats  
call "the terror of the bootlers"  
seems to be making a clean sweep  
in Missouri for a nomination for  
the office of governor. Let both  
parties select their best man.  
What is the Civil Service Commis-  
sion good for? The District of  
Columbia has 8,000 people in office,  
whereas under the civil service law  
the population is entitled to only  
75. No wonder General Grosvenor  
and Senator Bailey are in favor of  
the spoils system.  
Mr. Bryan expresses the opinion  
that among the qualifications of a  
judge sympathy with the people is  
as necessary as knowledge of law.  
We do not remember when a more  
mischievous fallacy than this has  
been let loose upon a too impres-  
sionable public.

## Note and Comment.

The cotton manufacturers of the  
United States will hold a conven-  
tion in Washington May 12.  
In Pennsylvania, Michigan, and  
Missouri the legislative tree has  
been shaken for political plums;  
but it cannot be denied that it has  
been a hard winter for grafts.  
The Children of the American  
Revolution have held their annual  
convention. There is now an op-  
portunity for the babies of the  
American Revolution to organize.  
Perhaps the emperor of Korea  
had his palace burned because he  
foresees that it would be cheaper  
than to have enormous repair bills  
voted by the committee on appro-  
priations.  
Six witnesses who had been sum-  
moned to the Smoot investigation  
have disappeared and cannot be  
found. If it is surmised that they  
had a revelation directing them to  
take to the woods.  
Instead of running for President  
Tom Johnson has built a sanitarium  
in Cleveland for purpose of treating  
men who have the whiskey habit.  
Does he forget that that is what  
gave them the habit?  
The Panama Commission wants  
men who are "immune" to go to  
the Isthmus of Panama to work.  
We know some baseball players  
who act as if they could not catch  
yellow fever or anything else.  
The trial of Beavers, the boss  
trouble-making in the Post Office  
Department at Washington, will  
begin next October. If he had stolen  
a pork chop or a bottle of milk he  
would have gone to jail last Oc-  
tober.  
Senator Bacon made a long  
speech in Congress on Monday  
presenting statistics to prove that  
under the tariff American machines  
and various other productions are  
sold considerable cheaper in Europe  
than they are in this country.  
The President received two ne-  
groes from the Methodist conference  
the other day, shook hands with them  
and said "You deserve equal rights  
with other men, irrespective of  
color or previous condition. I shall  
strive to secure to you these rights."  
In Brooklyn N. Y., the gas com-  
pany collects its bills easily. When  
a customer wants a light he drops a  
silver piece in the slot which turns  
on the gas and illuminates him with  
the quantity paid for. No meters,  
no bills, no squabbles.  
A Chicago judge has discharged  
a man who killed a policeman, hold-  
ing that the murderer was not re-  
sponsible because he had delirium  
tremens. Perhaps such a judge  
should be held to be irresponsible  
on account of softening of the  
brain.  
The wreck of the boodle machine  
in Missouri is complete. Joseph  
Folk, the terror of bootlers, has  
carried the state at the primaries,  
and may be Governor. The whole  
country watches with sympathetic  
interest the progress of this young  
reformer.  
On Wednesday the President  
planted an oak sapling in the White  
House grounds which was grown  
from an acorn shed by an oak  
tree in Russia. This excited and  
complimentary action ought to pacify  
those Russians who think America  
does not sympathize with their  
country in the war.  
The executive order giving age  
pensions is very weak in one re-  
spect under the law of Congress no  
pension can be granted to a veteran  
whose disabilities result from his  
own vices; but under the order  
which supersedes it, the most vicious  
are put on a level with the most  
virtuous, and all can draw pensions  
equally.  
Mr. Baker, a Democratic Con-  
gressman from New York, alarms  
the House now and then by mov-  
ing an appropriation of \$100,000 to  
reimburse the railroad for giving  
the President twenty-five free  
journeys. He demands a bill of  
particulars, which the railway will  
not furnish, and the hard-hearted  
speaker always rules the motion  
out of order.  
Prof. Frank H. Bigelow makes  
the alarming assertion that the sun  
is splitting through the middle, and  
that the great mass of molten mat-  
ter, a million miles across, is form-  
ing itself into two separate globes  
There will be plenty of time for the  
reader to put on his things, how-  
ever, for the sundering will not  
take place for about seventy-four  
million years.  
The Daughters of the American  
Revolution laid the corner stone of  
their Continental Hall in Washing-  
ton on the 19th, the anniversary of  
the firing of the shot that was  
"heard round the world." Six  
hundred and thirty chapters sent de-  
legates. Fifty Sons of the Ameri-  
can Revolution seated the guests,  
and the Marine Band furnished  
music.

A raw and stormy April sky an-  
ticipates a cool July.

The negroes of Virginia have  
organized with John Mitchell, edit-  
or of the Richmond Planet, as Pres-  
ident, pledged to boycott the cars  
on account of the new "Jim Crow"  
law.

David B. Hill fulfilled anticipa-  
tions by sternly dominating the  
New York State convention. His  
slate was adopted, but Tammany  
was given one delegate-at-large to  
Chicago.
