Follow A Seismic Wave.

For a dozen years to come men of science proposse to engage in a chase after earthquakes wherever they may manifest themselves throughout the world. The object is to learn something about earth-cases that may lead to a discovery quakes that may lead to a discovery of their causes. The hope is that something may develop which will enable scientists to warn persons in threatened districts in time so they may escape, just as is done now in the case of storms.

This international hunt for the earthquake was organized in Strasburg, Germany, during the last session of the International Seismic Congress. All the nations that joined in the work then have agreed to use all available government 163 departments to gather statistics 248 about earthquakes and to forward 1278 them to the central bureau in Stras-

burg. Rules and regulations have been 911 laid down for observation, and the members know just what facts should be gathered. Whatever money can be raised will be used for the establishment of observatories and experiment stations in lands that are sufferers from the disturbances.
