Bandon Recorder.

Miss Pearl Walker left last Thursday morning for Portland, on a visit to her sister Mae.

M. Brewer has been laying the foundation for a new house during the past few days. It will be 48x25 feet, and two stories high, when completed. He expects to build soon, but is not quite ready to commence construction yet.

Destructive Fire at Seattle.

Seattle, June 14.—Fire early this morning destroyed five store buildings, a lodging-house, a steam laundry and a part of the east end of the Latona bridge, causing a loss of about \$18,000. The property loss is covered by insurance amounting to about \$13,000. The origin of the fire is unknown.

Timber Going up in Smoke.

Forest Grove, Or., June 15.—Fire continues to ravage the timber in western and central Oregon. Settlers in the vicinity of Glenwood are fleeing for their lives. The Nehalem forests seem doomed and the loss will probably reach into the millions.

A virgin forest of the finest yellow fir, cedar and spruce on the coast is being consumed. It is mostly owned by syndicates but there are many tracts owned by individuals. No casualties are so far known.

A dense pall of smoke extends over the country for miles, and the flames last night were visible a great distance.

Loss Reaches \$130,000.

Oroville, Cal., June 14.—A disastrous fire broke out at 1 o'clock this morning, and when the flames were stopped, at 4 o'clock, the losses footed up \$130,000, with an insurance of \$70,000. The fire started in the rear of the Palace restaurant, a large wooden building, and before a stream of water could reach it the fire had communicated with the rooms of the Chamber of Commerce, and the hardware store of T. J. Kelly, all situated in the same building. The explosion of a hot-water boiler in the restaurant carried pieces of it nearly 500 feet, and spread the flames to adjoining wooden structures. The concussion when the boiler exploded broke many plate-glass windows in the vicinity. The flames spread to the wooden part of the Oroville Mercury, which, like the three places above named, was totally destroyed. The fire reached toward the north, and soon a row of fine stores was all ablaze. The fire then swept to the east and caught the two-story brick structure owned by Mrs. Amelia Ostroski, of San Francisco, which was totally destroyed. Twenty-eight firms or individuals suffered losses from the fire.
