Acts on Important Matters.

At the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce, held Monday evening, quite a number of important matters were acted upon.

Steps were taken to revive the matter of the removal of the Cape Arago lifesaving station to Charleston bay; also to stir up the Department in the matter of the fog signal at Cape Arago, which is said to have become an uncertain quantity in the calculations of coasting skippers.

In the matter of dredging Pony slough shoal, an endeavor will be made to have each of the ocean steamship companies operating here to contribute \$1000 each for continuation of the work being done by the government.

Steps were also taken to secure some oysters, of the Japanese strain of blood, to be planted in the bays. The postal authorities will be asked to put another clerk in the postoffice at Roseburg, so that Coos Bay mail arrived there in the night will be sent off on the first train instead of lying over a half day longer.

It will be seen that the Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce is doing good work in matters of vital importance to the bay.—Mail.

Coos Bay Chamber of Commerce met last night and the following improvements were discussed: The removal of the life-saving station to Charleston Bay and a better service for the fog whistle off the bar as several of the sea captains have been complaining lately that the whistle is not being blown as often as it should.

The monitor Wyoming and torpedo boat destroyers Paul Jones and Perry were sighted Friday evening from the Government works. The vessels were bound for Puget Sound to join the fleet under Admiral Glass, who is due at that point from an Alaskan cruise, but it is expected they will call at Astoria.

Engineer Wherret, with a survey corps, left Tuesday for Clear Lake to take levels and make a preliminary survey of the proposed water system that is to be put in between this body of water and North Bend.

Five fine skills to be used in the government light house service are being turned out at Wm. Holland's boat shop. Frank Lowe is putting them up. The Manzanita is to call for them and they will be distributed at stations along the coast.
