CIRCULATION OF THE BLOOD.

What Shakespeare Knew and What He Did Know About It.

In a letter to the Washington Star, a writer, who signs himself J. B. E. says:

"The discussions in the Star respecting Shakespeare's knowledge of the circulation of the blood before Harvey's theory was made public (which was after Shakespeare's dramas were written), induce me to call attention to the fact that the circulation of the blood upon some theory, others and different from that discovered by Harvey, was well known long before Shakespeare's time.

Galen, the Greek physician, who lived about the years 130 to 200, the author of a system of physiology recognized the circulation of blood as a physiological fact, and theorized upon it accordingly, and concluded that the arterial and venous blood had separate functions, the former to distribute heat and life through the animal system, the latter to serve for nutrition of the several organs. This theory was long accepted by his profession as true, but later investigations caused modified theories to be published concerning the admitted and well-known fact that the blood does circulate, notably those of Vesalius, the Flemish physician, about 1542; of Servet, the French theologian; of Colombo and Cesalpin, Italian professors (one at Padua and one at Pisa), a few years later, and all prior to Harvey's discovery, which was about 1615. Servet wrote a book called "Christianity Restored," in which he describes the circulation of the blood as though that were a well known fact, and endeavors to show that the human soul dwells in the blood. These authors seem to have spoken of the "circulation of the blood" as we now do. They had knowledge of the general fact, but their theories were erroneous, and it was left to Harvey, as a reward for many years of patient study, to discover the true theory and mechanism of the blood's circulation substantially as now accepted by science. If the first knowledge that the blood circulates was obtained in the lifetime of Shakespeare, he would not have been so attracted to his art as to make his characters of a preceding century would not represent them as familiar with steam railways and electric telegraphs.

The fact that some of Shakespeare's historic characters speak in a general way, as though aware of the circulation of the blood, is evidence not only that the fact was known to Shakespeare, but that he supposed the knowledge existed in previous ages, as it undoubtedly did.

It is not, however, probable that Shakespeare was aware of the true theory and mechanism of the circulation as afterward explained by Harvey and as it is now accepted by the world.

The case is very much as with the planets. They were known by the ancients to exist and to have motion, and their theories and explanations were given to the world three thousand years ago, but those facts do not detract from the wonderful discoveries of Copernicus, Kepler, Galileo and Newton, who first gave to the world the true courses of the planets and laws of their motions, as Harvey did of the blood.

Great Strike of Glass-Blowers in Pittsburg, Penn.

NEW YORK OIL MARKET EXCITED

Chicago Jubilates for the Pope—Died from the Effect of a Railroad Accident—Victims of the Wreck.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 3.—H. Sellers McKee Flint, glass manufacturer, in an interview stated that the number of firms that will shut down their glass factories on account of trouble with their employees is forty-three, and the number of skilled workmen employed is over 8000, to which should be added two or three thousand other workmen, or 11,000 men whom the shut down will throw out of work. Men other than those actually engaged in making and shaping glass will probably work until the stock in hand is exhausted. It is understood that the difficulty is to be solved by a committee from the Flint Glass-workers Association, whose decision will be final for the workmen in all the factories.

BIDS FOR ASYLUM SUPPLIES LET.

Salem Successful in Bidding Most of the Contracts.

SALEM, Jan. 3.—The contracts for furnishing asylum supplies for the next six months were let today. The Salem bidders were in most cases successful.

Victim of Railroad Accident Dies.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 3.—J. H. Anrie, one victim of the railroad accident on the Southern road, died at his residence in Covington, Ky., and his wife is reported to be in dangerous condition. The other wounded are doing well.

Corner on Oil.

NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—There is great excitement in the oil market, and the crowd around the oil ring is one of the largest ever seen. There is evidently a corner on shorts, and they are trying to cover with none but other shorts to buy from.

Pope's Jubilee in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Jan. 3.—Pope Leo's thirteenth golden jubilee was celebrated in Chicago yesterday at all the Roman Catholic churches. The services were most imposing. The gift of the Chicago diocese to the holy father consisted of a purse of \$10,000, which was sent to Rome, together with hearty congratulations.

All Was Not Told.

LOUISVILLE, Jan. 3.—A special from Greenwood, Ky., says: The fear grows hourly that the most terrible part of Saturday's wreck remains to be told. As time wears on and the wreck is cleared up it presents more victims and distress becomes apparent. When the wreck occurred it was thought the passengers who were in the ladies' coach and in the smoking car on the north bound train had escaped with trifling injuries. Just who they are, and how many, was not known last night. The horrible mistake was discovered when the bones of two unfortunate were found, almost reduced to ashes, buried with the burned cars. There is absolutely nothing by which they can be identified, and it is not certain whether the bones are those of male or female, or both. After the accident search was made for an unknown man who was seen to enter the toilet room of the ladies' coach on the north bound train an instant before the crash came. He was never seen again, and all efforts to locate him were given up. It is believed that he was unable to get out of the apartment and was burned to death in the car, and that the bones found last night are those of the missing man. A child, probably with its mother, died with her, its bones being burned in the debris. Suspicion grows that there are more people buried in the wreck than have been extricated.
