AN ESCAPED LUNATIC.

A Crazy Woman Leaps from Her Window at the Asylum.

SALEM, Jan. 7.—Sometime last
night a female inmate of the violent
ward at the asylum picked the
guard lock at the window of her
room with a nail, drew back the
iron netting, raised the window
and jumped out. She had previous-
ly clothed herself heavily, but her
feet were covered with only a pair
rubbers and two stockings. She
immediately started across to the
penitentiary and down the railroad
south to town, thence up the road
on her way to Portland, as she
thought. Although it was a bitter
cold night she was trapped with no
thought but a desire to reach Port-
land. At daylight this morning
persons at the depot at Werners
were astonished to discover coming
out of the gloom of early twilight a
phantom figure, passing the station
with hardly a glance at them.
Thinking her actions strange they
pursued her and brought her back.
She was nearly frozen, but the
best care was taken of her, and she
was returned to Salem on the
morning train. The authorities
had discovered her escape and
were scouring the country. They
found she had been frozen, but her
rescue occurred a day ago. She
appears now to be a little worse off
than the terrible experience.

PORTLAND, Jan. 7.—The cold
weather throughout the state is
reported as intensified to-night from
various points. Wires are working
badly between here and interior
towns, and many places are down.
Some business is expressed for
fearful frosts in some localities in
the Willamette Valley being frozen

SLAVERY IN BRAZIL.

Effect of American Arguments on Masonic Slave-Owners.

Slavery still exists in Brazil! A
curious event in this connection
was brought about by the recent
visit of two New York free masons
of Pernambuco, a maritime pro-
vince of Brazil, containing 900,000
inhabitants. The Masons in ques-
tion were officers of the United
States steamer Alliance, which ves-
sel, after an African cruise, put in
to Pernambuco. These officers,
were possessed of the thirty-second
degree, and such signified their
intention of visiting Cavaliheros
de Cruz Lodge and chapter of
that place. After being duly ex-
amined as to their Masonic qual-
ifications, the Free Masons of that
place extended to them a fraternal
welcome. The brethren of the
different degrees met in their large
hall together, the business being
transacted in the first or lowest de-
gree. But before admitting the
American brethren the Brazilians
discussed the Masonic teachings
and the practice of holding
slaves or trafficking in bonded
humanity, showing that they were
inconsistent with each other. It
was argued that they could hardly
receive and entertain Masons who
were absolutely free in thought and
possessions, while they themselves
were holders of slaves, and evi-
dently violating the law of univer-
sal human freedom.

In honor of the Americans thirty-
two members at once signed an
edict that after November 7, 1887,
no brother of that order should
hold any slave and should
liberate those he might possess on
that day; that before any new
member could be admitted he must
liberate every slave he might pos-
sess; that no member, under pain
of expulsion, should expose the
place of refuge of a slave, do any-
thing to punish a slave or allow
any one under his orders to do so,
and, lastly, he was forbidden to
practice any act which should give
authority or right to any man over
the body of another. The Ameri-
can brethren were then admitted
and told of the action of the assem-
blage.

LATEST DISPATCHES

Work of the Newly Appointed Committees at Washington.

ANOTHER RAILWAY ACCIDENT.

United States Agricultural Statistics—The
Rescued Crew of the Sunken Castle City
—Prosperous Seal Fishermen.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The com-
mittee on elections after a brief
secret conference to-day postponed
Carlisle's contested election case
until next Saturday, in order to
give Carlisle a chance to make a
formal reply if he choose to do so,
to affidavits submitted by con-
testants. The house committees on
judiciary, banking and currency,
coinage, weights and measures,
war claims, Indian affairs and
manufacturers organized this
morning and named days of meet-
ing. The committee on banking
and currency appointed Chairman
Wilkins, Landes, Schneider, Dingley
and Weller as a sub-committee
to consider the bill to reorganize
the national banking system intro-
duced by Wilkins.

AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.

The Great Crop of this Great Country in Figures.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7.—The sta-
tistician of the agricultural depart-
ment estimates the area of corn
harvested at 74,000,000 acres and
that it produced 1,456,000,000 bush-
els, the value of which was
\$646,000,000; area of wheat 37,400,
000 acres, produced 456,000,000
bushels, value \$300,000,000; area of
oats 26,000,000 acres, produced
659,000,000 bushels, value \$200,
000,000. Reports of winter wheat
do not show much decrease of area,
the average decline appears to be
between 1 and 2 per cent. The
condition is affected somewhat by
dry seed bed in districts that suf-
fered from drought, delaying feed-
ing, germination and growth. The
average condition is 96. The con-
dition of winter rye corresponds
very closely to that of wheat.

THE SEAL FISHERIES.

The Reports of Starvation Among Fishermen in Linn.

GLOUCESTER, MASS., Jan. 7.—
Several men from Millergale Green-
bay, Newfoundland, arrived here
to-day en route to Seattle to en-
gage in seal fishery. They report
the codfish and herring catch this
season, on the Newfoundland coast
as fairly good. Stories of starva-
tion in that locality, they say, are
false, and people are quite comfort-
able.

ANOTHER RAILROAD DISASTER

The President's Car Demolished and Mr. Ingham Hurt.

CINCINNATI, O., Jan. 7.—Two
passenger trains on the C. & I., St. L.
& C. collided near North Bend last
night. President Ingham's private
car was completely demolished and
the president and his assistant
badly bruised but not seriously in-
jured.

Rescued Crew.

HYANNIS, MASS., Jan. 17.—The
United States steamer, Kerballa,
landed here last night, Capt.
Thornton and 26 men, composing
the crew of the steamer New Castle
City, from New Castle, England,
for New York, was sunk December
23d, near Nantucket.

Emperor William's Health.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—Emperor Wil-
liam's rest was broken several
times last night. He is compelled
to be more careful than usual and
to abstain from any exercises or
duties which are likely to cause
fatigue.

The Crown Prince.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—The crown
prince was cheerful and took a
comparatively long walk to-day
from which he suffered no ill ef-
fects.

NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—During the
past year there were landed at
Castle Garden 361,619 immigrants.
