THE ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

A Chat With Mr. Allen About the New Lights for Albany.

The first installment of wire for N. H. Allen's electric lights—about four miles—for the big arc street lights has been received. Mr. Allen in conversation with a HERALD reporter last evening said that the other machinery will be due in a few days.

"It will take," he said, "about four weeks after all the machinery is here to get the plants together and the lights going. An expert will be employed for this purpose, and we will lose no time in doing this."

"The lights will run all night—as long as it is dark. As to the charges," Mr. Allen replied, "I cannot now make a definite rate, but it will be as low as any city in the state has, and I think Albany will have as good if not a better system than any in Oregon. I carefully studied the question before finally selecting these lights, and am confident that Albany will not be disappointed in them."

A total eclipse of the moon will occur on the 28th of the present month, under conditions peculiarly favorable for observation. The phenomenon will be generally visible throughout North and South America, Europe, Asia, and Africa.

Mount Hood smoking again. Yesterday the time-worn stock phrase, "Mt. Hood is smoking," was revived, says the Oregonian. A resident of the western part of the city arose at 5:30 a. m., and looking toward Mt. Hood, saw genuine black smoke, mixed with flashes of light such as are seen at Mt. Etna, during an eruption.
