Wm. Christian, a brakeman on the Narrow Gauge Railroad killed at Brownsville.

Information was received in this city yesterday that Wm. Christian, a brakeman on the Narrow Gauge railroad, was run over and killed at Brownsville Wednesday evening.

The accident occurred in switching freight cars. The unfortunate man slipped and fell between the cars and was frightfully mangled, the wheels passing over the entire length of his body, mutilating it beyond recognition.

The deceased leaves a wife and several children. His parents reside at Eugene, his father being one of the earliest settlers of that place. He was a son-in-law of Rev. J. S. McCain, former editor of the Salem Sentry.

Life-saving Station at Yaquina.

In following is the full text of Senator Mitchell's bill, making an appropriation for the establishment of a life-saving station and providing for a life-saving crew at Yaquina bay, in the state of Oregon, which was read twice and referred to the committee on commerce.

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled, that the sum of \$800 be, and the sum is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of establishing a life-saving station and providing for a life-saving crew at Yaquina bay, in the state of Oregon.

An appropriation of \$300 having been made to each military company in the state for the purpose of purchasing uniforms, Company F of this city are having their measures taken for the required uniforms. The measures are being taken at L. E. Blain's, who will have the regulation uniforms, sixty in number, made to order. WORK AT YAQUINA HARBOUR.

The Length of the Jetty—Over \$300,000 Needed to Complete the Work.

The reports of U. S. engineers, Maj. W. A. Jones and Capt. Chas. F. Powell, to the chief engineer at Washington shows the following condition of the work at the entrance to Yaquina bay: The project is to build a high tide brush and stone jetty about 4000 feet long, on the south side of the entrance, with shore protection, to close a rock obstructed channel for the purpose of providing a central free channel not less than twelve feet deep at mean low water. The total amount expended on the project to June 30, 1887, was \$192,626.55, and has resulted in the construction of 2517 feet of jetty and 450 feet of shore protection. The channel is now less shallow and is generally deeper, and is deflected permanently from the south rocks, through which the gleeer water sometimes ran. Amount expended during the fiscal year, \$29,778.30; required for completion of project, \$308,970; July 1, 1887, amount available, \$42,476.84.
