FOR A CUSTOM HOUSE AT YAQUINA

Full Text of Senator Mitchell's Bill to Appropriate \$50,000 for This Purpose.

In the senate of the United States on December 12th, Senator Mitchell introduced the following bill for the erection of a new custom house at Yaquina City, Oregon, which was read twice and referred to the committee on Public Buildings and Grounds:

Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives of the United States of America in congress assembled: That the Secretary of the treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to purchase a site for, and cause to be erected thereon, a suitable building, with fireproof vaults therein, to be used as a custom house at Yaquina City, Oregon. The plans, specifications and full estimates for said building shall be previously made and approved according to law, and shall not exceed for the site and building complete the sum of fifty thousand dollars: Provided, That the site shall leave the building unexposed to danger from fire in adjacent buildings by an open space of not less than forty feet, including streets and alleys; and no money appropriated for this purpose shall be available until a valid title to site for said building shall be vested in the United States, nor until the state of Oregon shall have ceded to the United States exclusive jurisdiction over the same, during the time the United States shall be or remain the owner thereof, for all purposes except the administration of the criminal laws of said state and the service of civil process therein.

NEWSY BROWNVILLE LETTER.

No Blame Attached to the Killing of Brakeman Wm. Christian.

A most shocking accident occurred here at the Narrow Gauge depot last night, when one of the brakemen on the freight train was killed almost instantly. A corner's jury was at once called and reported as follows:

We the jury in the above investigation of the death of Wm. Christian find that he came to his death on the 11th day of January, 1888, about 9:30 p. m. We find that the deceased came to his death by being crushed by the cars, having fallen under them in some way unknown to the jury, and we attach no blame to any one.

It seems they were making what is called "flying switch," and the man was standing on the back end of the tender, having gone there to uncouple a box car, and the engine started as usual with increased speed to get out of the way.

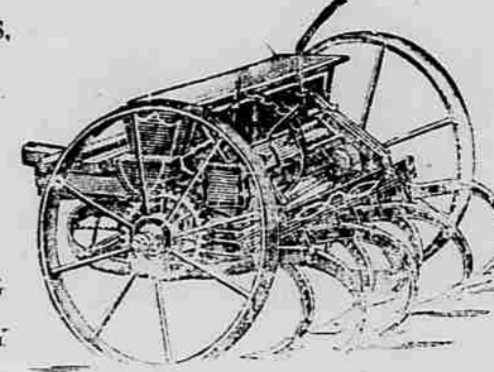
