OREGON FLOUR TRADE.

The Pacific Coast Trade with China and Japan—Competition with Manitoba.

Readers of the HERALD are not unfamiliar with the fact that there is a growing demand for Oregon flour across the Pacific, some shipments having been made by the Red Crown Mills of this city, and the prominent flouring mills of the state during the past year.

Discussing the question of flour supply on this coast, the Winnipeg Commercial observes that Oregon millers appear to be making good use of the new line of steamers put on by the C. P. R. R. between Vancouver and China and Japan. On each trip of these steamers we read of large shipments of flour across the Pacific.

Another feature in favor of the Oregon millers is that cheap flours are wanted. The expense of shipping cheap grades of flour to the coast is of course just as great as for fine grades. Were fine grades of flour most in demand, Manitoba millers would be in a position to compete more successfully with the Oregon mills.

The story goes that one week ago last Tuesday night a prominent physician of Salem was called to a room in the opera house to attend upon a woman who on Wednesday

A HORRIBLE CHARGE.

A Salem Mother Arrested for the Murder of Her Infant Child.

Salem, Jan. 14.—This afternoon a woman named Lizzie B. Georganias Van Pelt, was arrested by Sheriff Minto on a charge of infanticide. About ten days since she became the mother of a female infant and for several days refused to properly nourish her offspring. Her physician insisted in the meantime that the child should be cared for, but she insisted that she had not the physical means for nourishment. Last Monday the physician called and found the child missing. The woman said the child had died but her statements were so contradictory that the physician's suspicions were aroused, and he investigated the matter. He could not find where the child was buried and several circumstances conspired to make the case look very suspicious. As the woman was arrested to-day she will be examined on Monday.

One young man is said to have stated that he knew Wagner, the reputed father of the child, carried the body of the infant from the house on Sunday night; but when questioned about the matter to-day he refused to make any statement.
