EDITORIAL NOTES.

The free trade wolf is after the farmers' sheep. Farmers of Oregon will resist all such thrusts at their industries.

The latest rumor is that the Great Eastern will be brought over to New York and used as an ocean excursion boat and a floating hotel.

The king of Spain, though only seventeen months old, is said to be entitled to a salary of a million a year. But even that cannot hinder him from suffering from the infantile colic.

Chicago is moving in the right direction by taking measures to have exits of its large theaters made of sufficient dimensions to prevent all accidents in case of fire or other panics.

JANUARY this year will pass into history as being a month of unusual severity in this country, from east to west, and even across the ocean in London an unusual and remarkable fog prevailed, more so than has been known for years.

The Mormon brethren have applied to the Porte for permission to establish a community in Turkey, and it is expected that the request will be granted. If Turkey would win the everlasting gratitude of the people of the United States, let her bid for our whole Mormon population.

ENGLAND agrees with President Cleveland's free trade policy, and by way of gratulation says it would be a fine thing for this country. The people of this country, however, will have a word to say about it. It will be a small word and easily spelled, but very expressive. It will be a distinctly uttered "no."

ENTOMOLOGISTS show that the bee invented the canning business. When a bee has filled a cell with honey and put the cap on, he cures the cap with his stinger and deposits inside a drop of formic acid, which preserves the honey. This acid is the poison which he inflicts upon an intruder. A New York man claims he has circumvented the railroad ash up accident as well as the stove fiend. He has invented a made entirely of wood pulp, which he claims will not collapse, be smashed up nor burn from the stinging stove. And the future lions shall rise up and call him blessed—provided it is all so.

THE treasury department is now working on what is undoubtedly the largest single money vault in the world, and which will hold, in full, 100,000,000 silver dollars. Congress authorized the vault at last session, and the contract for the brick work has been let at cost of \$13,000. It will be 89 feet long by 50 feet wide and 11 feet 9 inches high, inside dimensions. The walls surrounding this secure house will be 4 feet 6 inches thick.

A long step in advance in the national matters has been taken, if the Chronicle is right in making that the scheme to make normal training a part of the regular public school course will be adopted in New York, and if successful will no doubt be introduced elsewhere. If too much is not expected at first, the plan can really fail of success. To teachers and girls the rudiments of the subject will go far to arouse interest in neglected departments of industry which offer good wages to those who excel in them.

THE English and Canadian fish commissioners, it is said, are meeting in Washington, hoping that congress will annul the tariff on fish and place fish and lumber on a free list. That would be a summation decidedly to be fought after by our cousins of Canada, but it would be a day of gloom

and the commencement of disaster to our own citizens who depend upon the fishing and lumber business for sustenance. But such considerations will not be thought of if politicians are convinced that there is political capital in a free list.

A LADY in Boston makes herself useful as well as financially successful. She studies the newspapers, posts herself on what's going on in the world, uses the scissors freely, pastes, writes and revises carefully until she has a condensed digest of the live topics of the day. This she reads to a class of wealthy women, who pay her well for furnishing them with information concerning what they ought to be able to talk intelligently about.

THE government of Denmark apprehended John A. Benson, who has been indicted for fraudulent land surveys in California, and who skipped out for foreign parts some months ago, and holds him for this country, although there is no extradition treaty between the two countries. U. S. Marshal Franks has been sent from Washington to bring Benson back for trial. The action of the Danish government is commendable and quite in contrast with that of the Canadian authorities.
