EDITORIAL NOTES.

SUNSET COX presides over the house of representatives during Carlisle's illness.

IRISH, of the Alta, is rather sanguinary in his proclivities. Just at present he is in mourning because a consignment of 15,000 dozen of Eastern eggs, which were delayed upon the way and became rotten, were dumped in the bay.

THE pope of Rome has signified his willingness to act as mediator between the English government and the Irish people in the home rule and other reforms demanded by Ireland.

A CERTAIN Mrs. Joshua Snow is said to have been present when, one hundred and six years ago, Daniel Webster was born and said of the infant: "This is an uncommon child. Look at his big head and eyes and the great size of his body. I tell you here is a wonderful child. He will be worth raising."

It seems to be the settled policy of the English government to imprison those of the Irish leaders who are physically unable to stand the rigors of prison life, until their deaths are brought about.

The Alta thinks Gov. Hill exhibits great wisdom. It says: "Governor Hill, of New York, seems to have a thorough knowledge of the legislature. He recommends the employment of a special counsel for that body, to see that bills are properly and grammatically drawn, so as to clearly express their intended meaning."

New York judges are after the typewriter business, which indicates, probably, that they have no doubt been tried beyond endurance by manifold copies of legal documents, and have made a new rule that all documents must be written on paper weighing fourteen pounds to the ream.

Congress is asked to pass some stringent laws upon the opium smuggling business, and the secretary of the treasury in submitting a bill upon the subject says: "Under the existing law the department was unable to suppress the smuggling of opium by systematic organizations on the Pacific coast. If congress is not disposed to prohibit or restrict the importation of opium for smoking and lesies to obtain a revenue therefrom, the present tax of \$10 per pound should be materially reduced, so that the inducement to smuggling shall be lessened."

Congress is talking of appropriating \$50,000 to expend in representing the United States in the Australia exposition next August, which will be held in Melbourne. These expositions are worth all they cost, and the appropriation could undoubtedly be timely.

For the year ending June 30, 1887, we exported to the British possessions in Australasia articles of the value of \$9,543,474, and imported a value of \$4,411,119, leaving the balance of trade largely in our favor. This Australasian trade ought to be highly developed, and California should certainly get her full share of it.

A very pertinent question for legislators in congress to consider, is whether we shall maintain a tariff on sugar, promote the manufacture of beet sugar in this country by liberal encouragement, or remove the tariff from sugar, thus destroying all chance of inducing the beet sugar industry.

The subject of performing public executions by electricity is still being mooted. Possibly some measure of that kind may be adopted, but eventually the relic of barbarism—capital punishment—will be abolished, and there will be no need of searching for a more humane way of taking human life.
