A MEAL OF MELODY.

Something About the Play "Nanon," to be Presented by the Pyke Opera Co.

The Pyke Opera Company, with Jeannie Winston and the old favorite stars of this popular company, will be in Albany next week for two evenings. Referring to the play "Nanon" the Helena Independent says:

After one has seen Nanon it becomes no wonder to note the fact that the play has scored prolonged and unprecedented runs in the large cities of the East. Look Out for the Eclipse.

A total eclipse of the moon will occur on the 28 of the present month, January, under the most favorable conditions for observation. The phenomenon will be generally visible throughout North and South America, Europe, Asia and Africa. The time for the eclipse is as follows: Moon enters shadow, 4 h. 30.2 m. a. m.; total eclipse begins, 5 h. 30.7 m.; middle of eclipse, 6 h. 16 m.; total eclipse ends, 7 h. 9 m.; moon leaves the shadow, 8 h. 7.3 m. p. m. It will be seen that the eclipse begins before sunset, the sun setting at that evening at 4:56. It will, however, be dark enough to watch its progress when it gets far enough advanced to be in the most interesting stage. The magnitude of the eclipse is 1.647, the moon's diameter being 1.

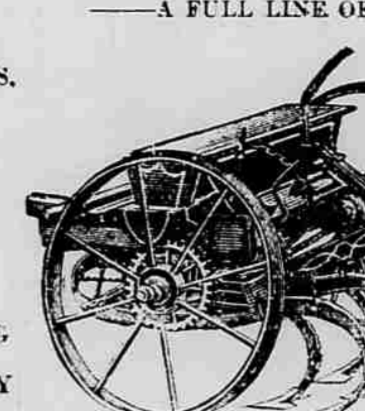

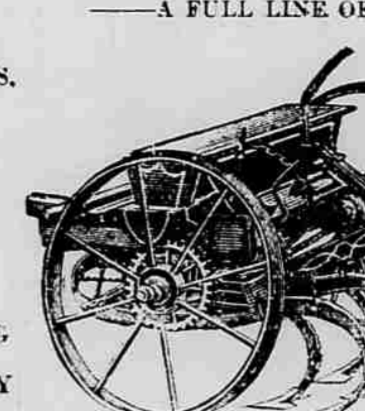
