PORTLAND MARKETS.

Wheat—Quiet. Markets abroad lend a rather easy tone to those on this side and both Chicago and New York fell off. London and Liverpool stocks are larger than accounted for by most of the trade. Our market is quiet and without change. Walla Walla is quoted about \$1 1/2 and Valley about \$1 1/2.

Barley—Fair brewing sold at \$1.05 per cental but the market is not a quick one, brewers buying largely in the interior on a short basis before.

Oats—The bulk of receipts noted is for shipment account and offerings on this market are not large. Feed qualities quoted 40-48 cts.

Eggs—Local rather weak at 27 1/2 cts. Some Eastern just reported to be offering at 24 cts.

A Bark Driven Back to Frisco
from the Columbia Bar.

TRAIN ROBBERS COME TO GRIEF
Their Leader Shot Down in an Attack on a Train—Big Fire in Red Bluff—Eastern News.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—The bark Kinfauns, fears for whose safety have been entertained for some time past, arrived in San Francisco bay late last night. The bark arrived at the Columbia bar seventeen days ago, and after taking pilot tried to cross the bar, but could not, so the captain stood out to sea, and getting so far to leeward steered for San Francisco to obtain provisions, with the Columbia river pilot still on board.

A BRUTAL ENCOUNTER.
Billy Myers knocks Harry Gilmore out in street stage.

NORTH JUDSON, Jan. 19.—The match for the light weight championship of the west, and one thousand dollars a side, between Harry Gilmore, of St. Paul, and Billy Myers, of Streater, Illinois, took place here this morning. The crowd numbered about two hundred. The two men had fought but twenty-eight seconds when Myers got in a terrific blow with his right hand on Gilmore's neck, Gilmore went down, and was unable to rise for ten seconds and Myers was declared the winner. The winner will receive 75 per cent. of the \$2000 stakes, and \$1140 taken in as gate money.

TRAIN ROBBERS REPULSED.
They Attack a Train and Their Leader is Killed.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 19.—An attack was made upon the Washburn train last night by robbers near Missouri City. The train was flagged and the engineer ordered out of his cab. The officials had information of the attempt and a volley from shotgun met the robbers and the leader shot was. The county officials are now in pursuit and some of the robbers have been captured.

Maiden Badly Wounded.
MORRISTOWN (Pa.), Jan. 19.—Miss Mary A. Brown, a maiden lady residing near here and possessed of considerable property, has been swindled out of \$30,000 by a Philadelphia woman, who claimed to make investments for women. She represented that she conducted a ladies bank, and promised large returns for every dollar invested.

Flouring Mills Burned.
RED BLUFF, Cal.—The steam flouring mills owned by G. M. Willard was entirely destroyed by fire last night with improved machinery worth \$12000. The plant was worth \$3,000 insured for half that amount. No cause is assigned for the origin of the fire.

Delayed Steamer Returns.
NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—Britannia, the overdue steamer, anchored off the light ship this morning. Nothing has yet been learned as to the cause of her delay.

Notable Dead.
BOSTON, Jan. 19.—Gen. C. G. Atwood, president of the Mutual Life Insurance company, New York, died this morning of apoplexy.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—Admiral Sir George Tryon will succeed Lord Charles Beresford as junior lord admiral.

A LONG HERMITAGE.
A Los Angeles Woman Who Lived by Herself for Seven Years.

LOS ANGELES, January 16.—Efforts of the City Council recently removing a little old house which stands on the city's lot on Front street have brought to light a strange story in connection with its occupant, a widow, known as Mrs. Jennie Leyes. A dozen years ago Mrs. Leyes and her husband came to Los Angeles from the East and took up their residence in the house in question. Mr. Leyes was in consumption, and after a long battle with the disease he died some seven years ago. Just before his death he called his wife to his bedside and told her he was confident he would return to her and give her information about the "spirit land" that would prove of great benefit to the whole world. A few minutes after this statement he died. After a good deal of trouble Mrs. Leyes' friends succeeded in getting her to bed in another room. Next morning she seemed to be in better spirits, and when her friend asked her why she was so cheerful she said her husband had appeared to her during the night and told her that she must shut herself up in the room in which he had died and neither leave it nor see anyone for eight years. He told her that at

the end of that time she would be given second sight, and that she would be able to materialize in broad daylight in any room or even out in the street. Mrs. Leyes believed that what her husband told her, or what she dreamed, would actually occur, so she went into the room and has not been out of it since. She is fed and waited on through a blind door by an old lady who has stood guard over her for seven years. So far as can be learned no one has ever caught sight of her during all of those years, and what business she had to transact has been through the blind door or broken window. Several attempts have been made to get her out of the room, but all have failed. A few years ago a gentleman who took deep interest in the matter applied to the Court for a writ of habeas corpus, but when the Judge learned his object, and was told that the poor woman was confined to her own pleasure, he refused to issue the writ and the woman has not been disturbed until now.
