THE LAMAR CASE.

Amid all of the talk pro and con in regard to the placing of Lamar upon the bench of the United States supreme court, there has been developed as a general view of the case out one fact and that is the position he occupied in relation to the government during the late war, and the consideration that the position of justice of the supreme court should not be occupied by a man who had at one time betrayed his trust and plotted against the government he had sworn to faithfully serve.

On the point of the confirmation the concluding remarks of the Chronicle very aptly puts the question when it says: "But, after all, the blame of an improper appointment cannot be saddled wholly onto Stanford and Stewart. They probably acted in accordance with their best lights—possibly a locomotive headlight—while it is due to Grover Cleveland that they had a chance to vote for Lamar. The president saw, or thought he saw, a chance to rivet another link in the chain which binds the solid South, and at the same time to make for himself a friend of the mammon of corporate unrighteousness, and so he nominated Lamar. Being nominated, the two corporation senators had a chance to show their lively gratitude for favors received, and favors hoped for, and confirmed him. The deed is done, and it cannot be undone; but Messrs. Stanford and Stewart will hardly refer to it as proof positive of their devotion to the Republican party."

The State Rights Democrat has for several weeks been howling about a subject its editor seemingly knows very little about—the tariff. He commends Cleveland's very thin policy of removing the tariff from wool, thereby destroying the farmers' profit on this industry, to make the great manufacturing monopolies richer, and then has the effrontery to pose as a friend of farming interests. He laments that the "treasury surplus" is increasing and regrets that the democratic party is unable to adopt some means to reduce it, and still upholds Cleveland, in spite of his pocket veto of the fiber and harbor bill, and then has the unmitigated gall to refer to the tariff rights organ as devoted to the progress and growth of this country. But then he is excusable on the grounds of his inability to rasp as great an idea as tariff reform, and more severe criticism ought to be reserved for stronger men.

The ability to make the best of all circumstances, in fact to make larkness appear as light, is a very happy possession at times, and seems to be possessed in an eminent degree by Irish of the Alta. Of the recent cold snap, which blackened the tropical plants in California, even as far south as Los Angeles, he says: "The present low temperature has killed some tender shrubbery and discouraged the heliotropes and lilies, but no vine nor tree has been harmed.
