Death of a Pioneer - A Pioneer of Yamhill Declared Insane - The Snow.

SALEM, Jan. 20. - Capt. Wm. Shaw, a venerable pioneer of Marion county, aged 92, died at the home of his son on Howell's prairie this morning at 6 o'clock, of general debility.

DECLARED INSANE. A pioneer of Yamhill county named Geo. Branson was brought over to-day, and after examination was committed to the asylum. He is aged 55 years, and has been in Oregon thirty years. He lost his mental balance by reason of an attack of typhoid fever six months since.
