EDITORIAL NOTES. THE Chronicle is of the opinion that those who have inclined to the belief that the capital stock of the Western Union Telegraph company represents a large amount of water will be surprised to learn from the president of the company that the lines could not be duplicated for the amount of the capitalization.

A suggestion from the national board of trade, upon the suffrage question, if adopted may lead to some good results in curbing the irresponsible foreign vote. It is to the effect that no foreigner be admitted to naturalization who does not display in the court to which he applies for citizenship a certificate from the customs officer, setting forth the date of his arrival, the place of entry into this country, the port from which he departed for this country, the place of his nativity and the country he immigrated from.

The patrons of the turf and fast horses are not content with the monopoly that has been secured in the agricultural fairs, but they are now trying to procure the major portions of some of the best parks in some of the leading cities for speeding tracks. Such an effort is being made on the Central Park, New York, and the Golden Gate Park, San Francisco. They evidently desire to have the whole world.

The ex-prime minister of the Hawaiian kingdom, Walter M. Gibson, a native of South Carolina, died of consumption in San Francisco last Saturday. From a filibuster seeking to wrest the island of Java from the Dutch, to a Mormon elder with the mission of making a Mormon paradise of the Sandwich Islands, then a sheep farmer, and finally Kaula's chief adviser and schemer, the eventful life of this man has almost been a veritable romance.

The Peoria Transcript aptly remarks: "There is one thing that can be said of James G. Blaine. Wherever he may be, he is always an American citizen, and is as proud of the title as an old Roman was in the days when the mere announcement was enough to bring respect. Contrast Blaine with such toadies as Lowell and Minister Phelps!"

The urgent appeals of President Cleveland and his predictions of disasters in store for the country, as set forth in his message, does not seem to influence democratic members of congress very materially, for thus far all measures proposing to reform the tariff have emanated from the republican side of the house and been consequently sat down upon at once.

Evidently the fame of American railroads has gone abroad in the land, but the sultan certainly should understand the difference between building roads and floating watered stock so as to own them after they are built.

THAT LEASE.

It will be remembered that during the session of the last legislature, Portland people, including the newspapers of that city were clamoring for the bill to give the O. R. & N. railroad the power to lease to the Union Pacific. Well the bill was passed in accordance with the wishes of Portland.

Now however it is discovered that Portland don't want the lease consummated and so an extra session of the legislature is to be asked for to repeal the act. The real objection to the bill is said to be contained in these words: "Provided, that nothing in this act shall be construed to authorize the leasing of any railroad line to any company or corporation owning a road which forms a competing or parallel line to its railroad."

Comment is unnecessary. The city of Portland wants now to place the whole in the hands of the Northern Pacific, and these words very appropriately placed in the law hinders the lease being consummated to that road. Hence the clamor. Portland may want an extra session but Oregon does not.

The democratic national presidential convention will undoubtedly be held in New York city, according to the wishes of President Cleveland, which indicates that Cleveland has the inside track and will be nominated. However, it does not follow that he will be re-elected.
