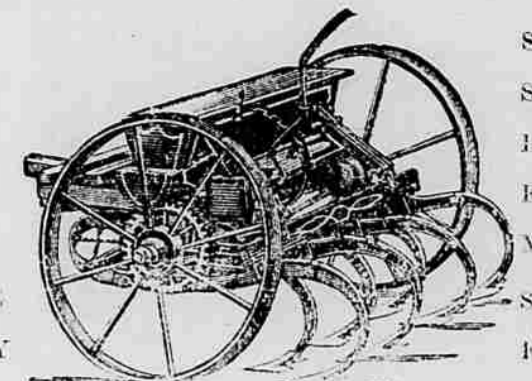

Regular meeting of the council held, Mayor Cowan in the chair, councilmen all present except Councilman Goin.

On motion Mr. Laurent was authorized to use the fire engine to pump out a gutter on First and Esplanade streets, to enable him to lay the sewer he has contracted to build...

Committee on ways and means were instructed to estimate the amount of money necessary to run the city for the ensuing year.

On motion a committee of three was authorized to purchase six thousand feet of lumber for the city. Committee: Tabler, Grauwohl and Writeman.

Application and bond of J. H. Goin to sell liquor in less quantities than one quart was approved and license granted, six months from the 1st of February.

Bids for the city printing were opened and the contract awarded to J. H. Burkhardt at 90 cents per job. The bids for publishing city ordinances were referred to the committee on ordinances to report at the next meeting.

The bids for building the crosswalks in the city were read and motion the bids were rejected and the contract directed to advertise for new bids.

G. A. Westfall was awarded the contract for ransoming dirt and gravel for the ensuing year.

On motion the watchman at the depot was instructed to guard against the introduction of small-pox by the trains.
