Mr. Nash & Legal Representative. In the suit of Nelson Bennett vs. the Oregon Pacific railroad for breach of contract, etc., Judge Shattuck yesterday allowed the motion to vacate the order heretofore made quashing the service of summons on Second Vice-President Wallis Nash and granted a stay of proceedings for six days. Last Saturday Mr. Nash filed an affidavit disclaiming that he is the head of defendant corporation, or that he in any way represents the same. He set forth that his duties are wholly delegated ones, imposed upon him by the board of directors in the absence of the president and vice-president, and that his occupation consisted of signing checks, contracts, etc. Judge Shattuck held that the foregoing were executive acts and constituted Mr. Nash, the head of the corporation, in the absence of the president and vice-president.—Oregonian.

CITY COUNCIL.

A Special Meeting Held to Take Precautions Against Contagious Diseases.

A special session of the city council was held Wednesday evening for the purpose of taking precautionary measures toward preventing the spread of contagious diseases. On motion a health committee consisting of Mayor J. L. Cowan, Councilman B. F. Tabler, and City Marshal Isaac Hays, was appointed, with permission to build a pest house, to employ physicians, and to communicate with the railroad companies, requesting their officers to report any case of small-pox if any was found ticketed for Albany. The chief of police was instructed to visit all trains and boats or to appoint a policeman for that purpose, and to report to the health committee any case of small-pox or contagious disease found.

Simple Tests For Pure Water.

Dr. Baker, of the Michigan State Board of Health, suggests the following simple tests for drinking-water: Color—Fill a bottle made of colorless glass; look through the water at some black object, and the water should appear perfectly colorless. A muddy or turbid appearance indicates the presence of soluble organic matter, or of solid matter in suspension. Odor—Empty out some of the water, cork up the bottle and place it for a few hours in a warm place; shake it, remove the cork and if the odor is in the least repulsive, the water should be rejected. By heating the water to boiling an odor is evolved that otherwise does not appear. Taste—Water fresh from a well is usually tasteless, even though it may contain a large amount of putrescible organic matter. Water for domestic use should be perfectly tasteless, and remain so even after it has been warmed. Heise's test for sewage contamination—Fill a clean pint bottle three-fourths full of water, dissolve a teaspoonful of iodine or granulated sugar, cork the bottle and place it in a warm place for two days. If the water becomes cloudy or muddy it is unfit for domestic use. If it remains perfectly clear, is probably safe to use.

NORTHWEST NOTES.

Senator Mitchell introduced a bill in the senate which provides for an appropriation of \$150,000 to build a public building at The Dalles, Oregon. A number of citizens of Salem have sent a petition to Senator Dolph, requesting him to urge the appointment of Prof. Woolly as teacher of the Indian industrial school near Salem, Oregon. Senator Dolph presented the petition to the commissioner of Indian affairs, with a request that Prof. Woolly be appointed. Secretary Vilas, of the interior department has recommended that the new land district provided for in the bills introduced by Senator Mitchell and Representative Hornman be formed. The recommendation has been sent to the committee of public lands of the house, and will, no doubt, insure favorable action by that committee upon the bill.

It should Pass.

The house of Representatives has passed Congressman Herman's resolution concerning the improvements on the Willamette river at Corvallis and Oregon City. If it is a concurrent resolution, as is inferred, it should pass the senate. Oregon ought to have a fair share of the money that will be expended at Washington.—Portland News.

WALLA WALLA WIND.

Its Effect Upon the Fruitful of Wash Ingot Territory.

Washington Cor. Boston Advertiser. One of the most curious and interesting features of the report of Governor Sempie of Washington Territory to the Secretary of the Interior, just printed, is the bit of tradition and rhetoric which he weaves about a zephyr through the mountains. "This east wind," he says, "the drying or chilling wind, according to the season, that blows down the Columbia river with great force sometimes, was called by them the Walla Walla wind, because it came to them from the direction of the Walla Walla country. In the winter this wind brings freezing weather, and sometimes will close the streams with ice. In the summer it is a parching wind, and its approach can be noted for long distances as it lifts the dust and debris high in the air. It is an odious wind, and no one wishes it to blow upon him. Fortunately its reign is always short. It rarely prevails for more than a few hours, but will sometimes continue for three or four days. Its enemy is the Chinook wind—so called by the Indians—who blow to above because it came to them from the direction of the country of the Chinooks. This is a balmy wind, coming from the Kuro Siwo or Great Japanese current of the Pacific ocean. In the summer it is a cool wind, and tempers the heat of summer so that nowhere in Washington Territory do people fall down with sunstrokes. In the winter it is a warm, moist wind, and is sometimes slightly poisonous, as if an e-lasion from the tropics. It is so gentle upon ordinary occasions that its presence cannot be noted by its motion, and it is almost unobtrusive in its effects. Snow will disappear before it with rapidity, and it seems to be able to blow for long distances between walls of color air without parting with its heat. Sometimes it constitutes an upper current, in which case the remarkable spectacle is witnessed of snow melting from the mountain tops while the thermometers in the valleys register below the freezing point. At other times it is the surface current, and follows the valleys and gorges as a flood might follow them. It seems to occur floating upon its wings, like Sanitation, the Angel of Payer, and it is not difficult to conceive that the Indians would wish to personify it in order to fix upon it their devotions.

The best information received leads to the belief that the year's crop will not be materially damaged by the recent freeze.
