A CHINAMAN'S CHILLY BATH.

He Gets Into the River and Remains for Several Hours Nearly Naked.

From Mr. Andrew Blevins, who resides near Blevins' Bridge on the Calapooia, is learned the particulars of a very chilly and almost fatal catastrophe that happened to a Chinaman, who attempted to cross the stream Thursday on horseback. The water was very high, occasioned by melting snow and ice, and the child-like Mongolian who milked cows and did chores on a neighboring farm and was returning home, rode unwittingly into the deep water. After being washed down the river several hundred yards he became free from his horse and climbed into a tree. His cries attracted the attention of Mr. Blevins who hastened to his assistance and with the help of neighbors procured a boat and rescued him. He had taken off nearly all of his clothing in his attempts to swim ashore and was nearly chilled to death by his long imprisonment.

His horse which was still swimming about in the icy water also nearly died was taken out alive. The Mongolian was taken to a farm house and warmed up, after which he seemed little the worse for his chilly experience.

RIVER AND RAIL.

Navigation Resumed on the Upper Willamette—The First Boat Since the Freeze.

All is again serene on the upper Willamette. The Wm. M. Hoag reached this city yesterday, being the first boat to make the through trip from Portland since the freeze-up nearly a month ago. The river is slowly rising and is now at a boating stage.

Since the thaw there has been several heavy landslides in the Siskiyou, and yesterday the trouble was not thought to be over. The train due Thursday and the delayed train of yesterday morning consolidated at Ashland and arrived here yesterday afternoon. Trains on the Oregon Pacific are running regularly.

Jan. 13—15 above; wind cold; sky clear; stock suffering from intense cold and present cutting winds; 4 inches more snow.

Jan. 17—8 above.

So far there has been no loss of cattle, but in one week more many will succumb if the weather does not moderate with a Chinook. Some sheep are dying, but stock generally is doing well.

Burglar Invade the Apartments of a Catholic Priest at Salem—The Murderer of Hitchcock not L yached.

SALEM, Jan. 27.—Sammy, the 13-year-old son of Edward Goin, of Albany, fell down at the Mute school yesterday while at play and broke his collar bone. He is doing nicely now.

REV. WHITE'S HOUSE BURGLARIZED. Father White, a Catholic priest returned home to day from a trip to Portland, and found his apartments had been entered by robbers and ransacked, but nothing was taken.

A SHOCKING CRIME. The Murderer of Hitchcock and Wife was not lynched.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 27.—Accounts published this morning of the lynching of the murderer of Hitchcock and wife near Santa Ana last night are incorrect. The murderer was hidden in Anchin over and to escape the mob, and brought to jail in this city this morning. The particulars of the murder are as follows: C. B. Hitchcock and wife, living near Garden Grove, five miles from here, on Monday sold their ranch to Fritz Anschlag a young German, for \$8,000, receiving part payment. Hitchcock was attending his team, between 9 and 10 p. m., as usual, and was waylaid in the barn by Anschlag with an ax. Following this up by killing Mrs. Hitchcock, he loaded both bodies in a wagon and driving to this forsaken place, buried them and came back to Santa Ana by daylight.

SMALLPOX ON SHIPBOARD. A Steamer Arrives with the Yellow Flag Flying.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 27.—The Steamer City of New York from China and Japan, entered the harbor this afternoon flying the yellow flag, with three cases of smallpox on board. The purser contracted the disease before the steamer started and was left at Hong Kong, and a lady passenger died on the passage. The steamer was placed in quarantine.

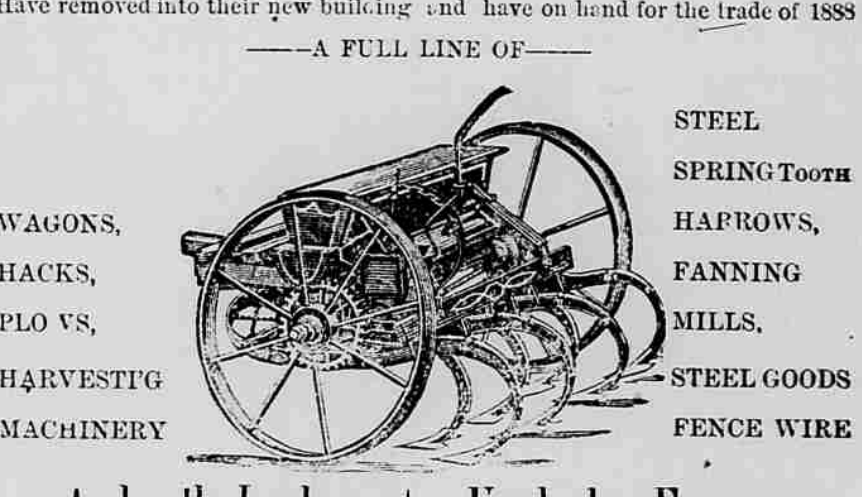
