The Child of Mount Vernon.

George Washington Parke Custis died at Arlington, near Washington city, on the 10th of October, 1857. He left one child, the wife of Robert E. Lee, afterward the Confederate general. Closely allied to the Washington family, fond of calling himself the child of Mount Vernon, he was never so much in his element as when he was talking or writing of the great chief and the men and times of the Revolution. As he said of himself once, "his was the destiny of no common man," for he had been fondled on the knee of the Father of his Country, and received from him the kindness of a parent. He repaid that care and affection with filial devotion, and to the day of his death all the recollections of life centered around or radiated from the time when he was one of Washington's family. He lived to a good old age, retaining his mental faculties to last. Though Mr. Custis was never in public life, he was in his younger days an eloquent and effective speaker, and had a fondness for oratory as long as he was able to gratify those who constantly called on him to make public addresses.—Ben Perley Poore's Letter.

THE BLOOD OF BRITISHERS.

The Removal of British Members of Parliament Arouses a Mob.

LONDON, Jan. 28.—Father McFadden and Alexander Blaner, members of parliament arrested for alleged violation of the crimes act, were removed from jail at London this morning and taken to Dunfongahy, where they will be tried. A crowd gathered outside of the jail last evening and remained all night, cheering continually. A few stones were thrown at the police as the prisoners departed by persons in the crowd. Fears are entertained that the trouble will increase.

A BIG RAILROAD SCHEME.

A Long St. Arch of Road to be Built in the South.

TOPEKA (Kansas), Jan. 28.—The charter of the Kansas, Texas and Mexican railroad was filed with the secretary of state yesterday. A company with a capital of \$50,000,000 propose to build a line from Kansas City through the state of Kansas to Clarke county, thence south through No. Man's Land, Mexico, and the Parhandle to El Paso, a distance of 1200 miles. Another branch to run from Medicine Lodge southwest into and through Colorado and New Mexico, to Albuquerque, 500 miles. In addition to these there are numerous other shorter branches in Kansas and Nebraska. The directors are citizens of Kansas.

A NOTED STAGE ROBBER.

Black Bart Says that He will Never Take to the Road Again.

Charles E. Bolton, alias C. E. Boles, P. O. 8, alias "Black Bart," the noted stage robber, who for many years proved himself to be the prince of road agents, was discharged from San Quentin Saturday, after completing a six years' sentence, for robbing the stage running between Milton and Senora, on November 3, 1883. Black Bart was as commonly known, began operations on July 26, 1875, when he held up the Milton and Senora stage, and made off with the treasure box. The county was scourged for years by sheriffs and constables, who were anxious to get the robber in order to receive the reward offered for his apprehension. He succeeded in robbing twenty-seven stages before he was caught, and then he was detected through the laundry marks on a cuff lost by him when he attempted to escape after a robbery. He did not make legal fight when caught, and upon pleading guilty was given a light sentence of six years' imprisonment. Bolton was received at San Quentin, Nov. 21, 1883, and was assigned for duty as a trustee. While in jail he was noted for his uniform good behavior, and his conduct entitled him to credits under the law. As Bolton is now 60 years of age it is hardly probable that he will again take to the road.
