THE PYKE OPERA COMPANY.

The Entire Company, Jeannie Winston and All, Will Play Here Two Nights.

Mr. Chas. H. Marsh, advance representative of the Pyke Opera Company, is in the city. He states that it has at last been positively decided to play two evenings in this city, Friday and Saturday evenings, February 3d and 4th, playing respectively "Black Mantles" and "Nanon." The entire company, Jeannie Winston and all, will be present. Concerning the popular opera "Nanon," the Portland Oregonian says:

The magnificent audience which was present last evening to welcome Jeannie Winston and the Pyke Opera company on their return from a most successful "eastern season," and the enthusiastic applause freely lavished on the many pleasing numbers of the opera proved conclusively that Portlanders appreciate an opera well given. "Nanon," the last of Jeannie's successes, was the opera, and this was its first production in Portland. That it was a success all who were present will admit. There is such a delicious melody, in the shape of a waltz song which has been familiar to every body, running through it, appearing in all sorts of guises and variations, to gether with a most delightful quartette in the second act and several other finely arranged and melodious numbers, all of which go to make up a whole whose charm and beauty linger in the memory long after the opera is over. It was very well produced, both in the matter of acting and singing. Miss Winston made a most charming Nanon de l'Enclos. Her voice retains its wonted charm and she sings with all the skill and expression ever so characteristic of her work. The Convent song from "Falka," which she introduced in the last act, received a pronounced encore, as did also her solo in the second act, and she was the recipient of many beautiful floral pieces. Here costumes, too, were tasteful, rich and elegant, and she looked every inch the social queen. Miss Manfield was a most naive and altogether taking "Nanon." She was full of vivacity and ingenuousness, and acted the role as only an artist could. She dressed the part, too, most becomingly. Louis de Lang, as was to be expected, was most amusing in the Marquis de Marsillac, and traces of his keen wit and satire could be discerned in many humorous lines of his dialogue. Mr. C. M. Irvine was a pleasing Marquis D'Aubigne. Miss Genevieve Reynolds as the Madam de Maitenon of the last act was the personification of queenly dignity, and a startling contrast to the hobbler-de characterizations she gave of Aunt Theresa in the first act. The assumption of two such widely different roles is at least an evidence of her versatility. Mr. Joseph Greenfelder as the Abe made his first appearance before a Portland audience and was most cordially received. He has a strong, full-toned basso voice, is an easy actor, and his singing of "The Friar" (introduced) was most enthusiastically received. He will no doubt become a favorite. Frank Valera as the Vicomte de Marsillac gave a very good representation of the callow would-be-bean, and sang the song, "It's only a matter of time," so as to receive an encore. The remainder of the cast and chorus all did good work. In the ensemble at the close of the second act, itself a finely arranged number, the full strength of the company showed well and sang the music splendidly. The opera was well costumed, and judiciously staged, and with a few exceptions went quite smoothly throughout. The orchestra under the very skillful leadership of Mr. Carl Mattens was ample. If last night's enthusiasm is a guide, the opera will have a successful run.

The transfer of the O. & C. It is thought that the formal transfer of the Oregon & California road to the Southern Pacific will take place between the 10th and 20th of February. The filing of the mortgage to the Union Trust Company of New York enables the company to issue new bonds, as provided for in the agreement for the sale, and the only other legal step necessary is to take the road out of the hands of the U. S. court. This will probably be done by the bondholders withdrawing the foreclosure suit.
