Iron Workers' Wages Reduced in Pennsylvania.

A BANK DIRECTOR COMES BACK.

Two Months in Prison—A Duel with Swords

—Reluctant to Work—Found Dead

—Fire in Buffalo.

JOHNSTOWN, Penn., Feb. 1.—A general reduction of 10 per cent. in the wages of employes of the Columbia iron company went into effect to-day. They are running as usual in all departments but the wire mill; these men are now holding a meeting with closed doors. No trouble is anticipated by the company. Upwards of ten thousand men are employed in the works, and all are effected by the reduction.

Loss By Fire.

BUFFALO (N. Y.), Feb. 1.—The large drygoods establishment of Barnes, Henger & Co. is on fire, with indications of its being a total loss. It is reported that a number of lives have been lost in the fire, but nothing definite can be learned. As yet Barnes, Henger & Co.'s establishment is a complete loss. Howard, a member of the firm, states that all the employes are safe and reports their loss on stock at \$750,000. The fire is now under control. Stores on the opposite side of Main street have been seriously damaged by fire and water. The fire broke out in the basement and spread with such rapidity that it was with much difficulty that the 450 employes in the building were rescued, many of them being rescued from upper stories by firemen. The building was a handsome iron front five-story-high, and owned by C. J. Hamlin. Insurance on the building, \$60,000, and on stock, \$600,000. The total loss is estimated at \$1,200,000, with about half enough insurance to cover it.

Pleads Not Guilty.

CINCINNATI, Feb. 1.—Eugene I. Seaman, formerly director in the Fidelity National bank, was in Europe when he was indicted by the United States grand jury for complicity in the transactions of that bank and returned this morning. He went before Judge Sage, pleaded not guilty and gave bonds in the sum of \$20,000.

The Mining Calamity.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 1.—The work is not yet resumed in any of the colliers at Wellington or Nanaimo since the explosion. The miners are holding mass meetings and making an effort to ascertain the best means to provide against such a disaster. Another public meeting will be held to-morrow night here. The miners are somewhat nervous about returning to work in the mines.

Released from Prison.

DUBLIN, Feb. 1.—Ex-Lord Mayor Sullivan, of Dublin, was released from Billamore prison to-day, after two months' confinement. A large crowd was gathered in front of the building and greeted Sullivan with great enthusiasm. Sullivan then received addresses from various delegations.

The Earth Quakes.

POSTON, Feb. 1.—Earthquake shocks were felt at many points in Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont at 11 o'clock this morning. No damage is reported, but the shock was severe enough to rattle windows, etc.

An Aged Actor Dead.

MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 1.—William McFarland, one of the oldest actors in the country, was found dead in his bed yesterday. McFarland supported Macready when in this country, and later the elder Booth, Edwin Forrest and all old timers.

Duel in Paris.

PARIS, Feb. 1.—A duel with swords was fought to-day between M. Vignon, formerly secretary to M. Rouvier and M. Bauer, editor of the Gilblas. Vignon's left arm was pierced by M. Bauer's sword.

Love Restores a Girl's Sight.

Young James Robertson Blackie, of the Glasgow firm of publishers, has been the hero of quite a romantic marriage. Some years ago he fell in love with a fair American girl, a niece of the late President Arthur. When she had finished her education in Glasgow they were provisionally engaged, and she returned to America to nurse her dying grandfather. After his death she was attacked by fever, a result of the great strain and fatigue of nursing.

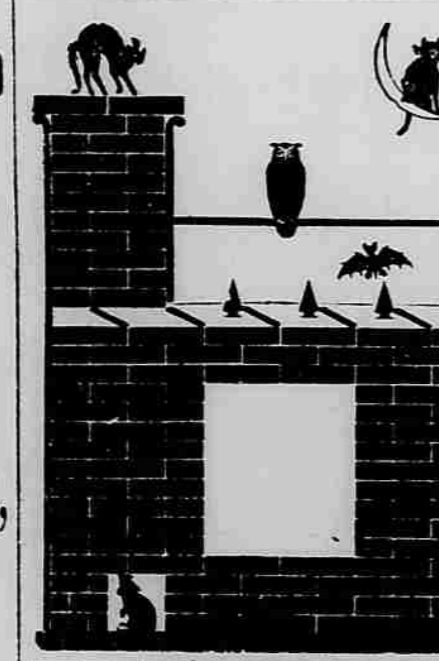
