U. S. SIGNAL SERVICE.

A Daily Telegraphic Report of Weather and Storm Signals.

Arrangements have been made by U. S. Signal Service Observer John Briggs, of this city, to receive each evening by telegraph the signal service weather indications for the next twenty-four hours. The dispatches will be printed in the HERALD each morning, and the signals will be displayed from the HERALD office building and at Burkhardt & Keeney's office on First street.

The report should have commenced yesterday, but owing to landslides in Southern Oregon the wires were prostrated. It will be commenced probably to-day. Following are the signals to be displayed and their significance: Red moon—Much heat; rising temperature. Red star—Less heat; stationary temperature.

Red crescent—Least heat; lower temperature. Blue moon—Much moisture; general rain or snow. Blue star—Less moisture; local rain or snow.

Blue crescent—Least moisture; fair weather. Black square—Cold wave approaching.

The C & O Blockade. The landslides on the California & Oregon road have hemmed in two passenger trains at Sissons, leaving on board between 100 and 200 passengers. The trains were, on their way down from Portland and have been "dirt-bound" since Sunday. On that evening an attempt was made to convey passengers by wagon to Dunsmuir, but advice being received that the stage road from the latter place South was washed out, it had to be abandoned.

Owing to the imperfect working of the wires but meagre information about the belated travelers has been received by the railroad officials. They had plenty of food however at Sissons, and on one of the trains there is a barn-burning theatrical company that is giving matinees and nightly performances at the Sissons hotel.

Everything is being done to clear the track cleared before the end of the week, and according to what Superintendent of Track Curtis said to-day a number of miners have been set to work sluicing the debris in several places. In addition 700 men are now at work with pick and shovel.

The Pyke Opera Company. Lecture by Prof. Condit of Albany—Can rushes grow without mire, or the influence of current literature.

Song, Gliding to Fairyland—Misses. Rinchart and Sprenger. Essay by Miss Lillie Davis—Evangeline.

SECOND DAY. Meeting presided over by J. M. Williams of the executive committee.

Methods of teaching History—Miss Lane. Rev. H. Gould of Shedd was called upon for remarks. He spoke of the duties of directors and the example and influence of teachers.

A discussion of manners and morals in school followed. Writing—H. W. Herron. J. G. Gibson led in physiology.

J. M. Williams spoke very emphatically on making the hygienic part the most prominent and having the pupils make practical use of such knowledge.

Report of Committee on resolutions, H. W. Herron. Miss Anna Godley and J. G. Gibson, was adopted. The balance, \$454.50 was donated to us by our friends, and we take this opportunity to publicly express our gratitude to all who have kindly aided us in this undertaking.

We will strive to make the best use of the talents with which you have entrusted us, and we feel confident that the influences that go forth from here shall be such as will subserve the highest welfare of our growing city.

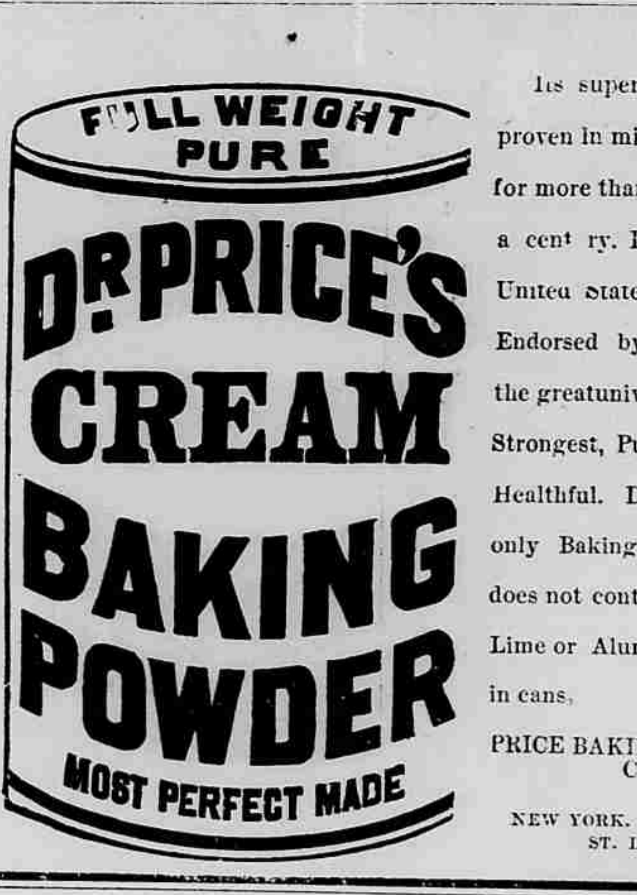
