MANUFACTURED ISSUES.

The result of fanning the flames of party strife into sufficient burning intensity to accomplish the purpose of interested parties, so that their interests can be enhanced goes on with varying success. The tariff and the revenue are flourished as the castigating whips to arouse the wrathful ire of unsuspecting suffragists, with the intention of driving their ballots in the direction desired.

That all of this "worked up" matter, cannot but be acknowledged by those who possess observing minds and properly post themselves upon the situation. For instance, contrast the honest expressions of some of the leading papers upon the revenue question, of which a party scapegoat is attempted to be made. The St. Louis Globe-Democrat, a leading republican paper, says: "Even after the war began and the public expenses were increasing daily at an enormous rate, congress refrained for over a year from levying internal taxes, seeking to avoid that necessity by sales of bonds and by increasing the tariff duties. It was not until July, 1862, that the internal revenue system was established; and the people submitted to it without complaint only because it seemed to be indispensable to the prosecution of the war and the preservation of the union. It answered the purpose splendidly and has yielded to the government since that time over two thousand millions of dollars; but the necessity which brought it into being no longer exists, and instead of a deficit we now have a surplus of revenue. Those who contend that it should be discontinued with a view to relying mainly upon the tariff for revenue are acting consistently, therefore, with the precedents and teachings of national history; and it is not saying too much to add that they also have good sense on their side to the extent that their argument implies that it is better to make foreigners pay taxes than to pay them ourselves."

Observe now the similarity of opinion, though differently expressed of the Atlanta Constitution, an able but radical democratic journal, commenting upon the same theme: "Deep down in the democratic heart is the feeling that the federal government has no business, in these piping times of peace, to collect excise taxes that are not necessary to the support of the government. If the people of this country were to rest quietly under the infamous internal revenue system now in operation they would form a decided contrast to every other people under the sun. If Congressman Stewart will read the history of excise taxes he will discover that wherever they have been imposed the people have paid them grudgingly. The Roman excise was abolished by Caligula, and in commemoration of that event small brass coins were struck and some of them may be found in collections to this day. Owing to the tremendous debt that war after war has saddled on England, the people of that country have been compelled to submit to an excise tax for many years, but Blackstone says that 'from its first origin to the present time its very name has been odious to the people of England; and Dr. Johnson, in his dictionary, gives this definition of 'excise,' namely, 'a hateful tax levied upon commodities, and adjudged, not by the common judges of property, but by wretches hired by those to whom excise is paid.' This definition pretty nearly hits the mark even in these times. The internal revenue system of this country, however, bears no relation to the system employed in England. Here it is the Russian method, pure and simple. The tax is unnecessary; and we have no hesitation in saying that there is not a genuine democrat in Congressman Stewart's district who is in favor of perpetuating the excise laws. The perpetuation of this system is opposed to the liberties of the people and it is distinctly opposed to democratic policy. But even if the perpetuation of the tax were a part of the democratic policy, what

guarantee would the people have that the provisions of Congressman Stewart's bill would be permanent? The simplest, the easiest, and the best method of modifying the internal revenue system is to repeal it, and if Congressman Stewart will consult his constituents he will discover that they are almost unanimously in favor of this simple plan. They could not afford to be otherwise."

We see from these that both parties are demanding the same thing, as indeed they are in the tariff question—the revision of the schedule of rates. Then where is the grounds for raising a party issue upon those subjects? Only that by so doing personal aims may be accomplished, and political capital manufactured to the detriment of the real interests of the country.

ADMIRAL HENGE, the commander of the British naval fleet on the Pacific coast, is said to be a hot-headed old sailor, who threatens direful proceedings if the Corwin or any other United States revenue cutter dares to interfere with Canadian or English vessels in Behring's sea. Probably he will succeed in getting his government into difficulties.
