AN ERA OF GROWTH.

Some of the Building and Improvements Planned for the Coming Season.

Evidence of the fact that there will be no cessation in the busy era of growth which Albany has taken on during the past year and a half is exhibited by the plans made for new buildings and improvements during the coming season, and the fact that even during the winter work has not been suspended on brick buildings now in process of construction.

It is too early yet to predict definitely as to the extent of building to be done, but present indications show that the outlay will be heavy. Messrs. Foshy & Mason and Tweedall & Hopkins have already completed plans for an elegant brick where the latter's store now stands, upon which work will be commenced early, the brick being now nearly all on the ground.

The Masonic lodges of the city are arranging for erecting a fine brick this season, for which purpose a meeting was held last night. Judge R. S. Strahan is having plans prepared for a two-story brick, to go up where his wood-yard buildings were recently destroyed by fire, and it is likely that W. L. Vance will also erect a large brick on the corner adjoining Judge Strahan's.

Messrs. Cowan & Cusick expect to erect a fine brick on the corner they purchased last year from Dr. F. O'Toole, in which event they will build a fine corner, to be occupied by the Linn County Bank, and other business rooms.

Plans are being made for other buildings and a large number of residences. There is now not a vacant dwelling in the city and the demand far exceeds the supply. This has led to a sharp advance in rents, and will force the building of a greater number of residences. All this is indicative of a steadily increasing population and a healthy growth.

Albany has taken on a growth which cannot be stopped. It has natural advantages, a magnificent water power, competing transportation lines, the heart of the Willamette Valley surrounding it, and is fast becoming a metropolitan business center. An electric light plant will soon be in operation, and a street railway is seriously talked of.

One thing Albany needs and will soon have; that is a commodious brick hotel. The city has two as good hotels as they can be made in their present buildings, but they are wooden structures, and the growth of the city demands a good three-story brick hotel. Some shrewd man with means will come along some day and put up such a building and make money out of the investment.

Lightning Express.

A San Francisco exchange of February 2 says: "A lightning express is soon to be put on the Oregon line to make the trip between this city and Portland in thirty hours instead of thirty-six, as at present. The train will stop only at order stations, leaving this city at seven a. m. Order stations will be as follows: Port Costa, Suisun, Sacramento, Marysville, Chico, Red Bluff, Redding, Dunsmuir, Sisson, Montague, Ashland, Grant's Pass, Roseburg, Eugene City, Albany, Salem and Portland.

This train will be run to comply with a demand made by the people of Marysville, Chico, Red Bluff and other towns in Oregon for day as well as night service. It also gives better satisfaction to travelers between San Francisco and Portland, many desiring to leave here in the morning instead of in the evening as at present. The train will probably not be put on the line until the track through the Siskiyou is in good order.

Death of Mrs. Nolan.

A dispatch was received in this city yesterday announcing the death of Mrs. J. M. Nolan at Corvallis. She is a sister of James Callahan of this city and had many friends here, who will be grieved to hear of her death. The funeral will occur at 10 o'clock Monday at Corvallis.

A concert under the direction of Prof. Hepburn will be given at the M. E. church some time next week for the benefit of the pipe-organ fund of that church.

HALL TO BE DEDICATED.

GRANTED A NEW TRIAL.

Burglar Ryan Taken From the Penitentiary to be Retried in This City.

Salem, Feb. 4.—Deputy Sheriff Humphrey, of Linn county, this evening took to Albany J. C. Ryan, who was recently granted a new trial by the supreme court. He has been in prison several months. [The above dispatch was received at this office last night. Ryan was arrested at Scio last fall on a charge of burglary with intent to commit rape upon the person of Ella Mack. He was indicted by the grand jury in this city for simply burglary, but the jury returned a verdict of assault with intent to commit rape, and he was sentenced under this verdict. The supreme court held that he could not be convicted upon a charge for which he was not indicted, and granted him a new trial. He was brought to this city last night and incarcerated in the county jail to await trial at the next term of the circuit court which convenes in March.]
