It shows Hackleman's new addition, the new railroad line's branches and switches, and the Santiam canal with all its branches. It is a valuable piece of work.

Nast's Pictures. Some very remarkable productions of Thos. Nast are exhibited in Blackman's show window. The picture of Mt. Hood was painted for the Oregon Alpine Club, of Portland, in six minutes; Niagara Falls was painted in seven minutes, the Mount of the Holy Cross in seven minutes, Mt. SALVATION ARMY ROW.

Wholesale Arrests for Disturbance the Quietness (?) of Their Meetings.

A row occurred at the Salvation Army hall Saturday night, which resulted yesterday in the arrest of about a dozen of the young men who were present on a charge of disturbing their meeting. As they could not all be tried together one of the defendants, Pete Montgomery, was arraigned at 1 p. m. in Justice Morris' court to answer to the charge. A jury trial was had, at which the evidence showed that the Salvationists were about as implicated as those who were arrested. At the conclusion of the testimony the prosecuting attorney L. H. Montevine moved to dismiss the case, but the jury were instructed by the court and retired for deliberation. They returned in about five minutes with a verdict of not guilty. The attorneys for the defense were Capt. N. B. Humphrey, W. R. Bilyeu and D. R. N. Blackburn. The complaints against the others were dismissed. It is understood that complaints against some others, including one or two members of the Salvation Army, will be lodged to-day for assault and battery.

It is certainly the duty of the city officials to see that young men do not interrupt any religious meetings in the city, but these Salvation Army sappers, who go down into the street after their meetings have adjourned to indulge in a free fight with boys ought not to expect much sympathy if they are also run in, and taught by an application of law that religious teaching can not be administered in a well regulated city after that fashion. It might be a noteworthy fact that a large percentage of the arrests for disturbing the peace and fighting in the city occurs in and about the Salvation Army hall.

DEATH OF SAMUEL COWAN.

Samuel Cowan, son of Andrew Cowan, and brother of Mayor J. L. Cowan, died at his home in this city on the 5th inst. of pulmonary disease, aged 28 years and 2 months. The deceased was born in Linn county, and resided here for several years. He was engaged in the stock business for about five years, but was taken ill about a year ago and recently removed to this city in hopes of benefiting his health. He continued to grow worse until Sunday morning when he passed away. The funeral occurred yesterday, when his remains were followed to their last resting place by a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends. He leaves a wife and three little girls to mourn his untimely death. In his demise a good man has been cut down in his early manhood and the community deprived of one who was ever conscientious, fair and upright in all his dealings, and who was but just entering upon his life as a useful and respected citizen.

BROWNVILLE NOTES.

Kicked by a Horse--The Calapooia and Blue River Mines.

BROWNVILLE, Feb. 5. On the 3d inst. a son of Mr. O. P. Coshaw was kicked over the left temple and side of the head by a horse in the stable, and late last night was still in an unconscious state, but breathing quite regular, though in great suffering. Drs. Starr and Crawford were called, and everything is being done for the unfortunate young man. Our broom factory is beginning to introduce their brooms, and are making a good article and should receive every encouragement from our town. There are many openings for more factories here, for with the water power and the nearness to such fine timber resources up the Calapooia we ought to have plenty of woodworking machinery constantly running, to keep pace with our woolen mills, sawmills tannery, etc.

Since the advent of fine weather here of late, we hear considerable talk about the new mines on the head of the Calapooia and Blue rivers, and it looks now as if there would be quite a rush in the spring as soon as the snow is gone. The chances look favorable for a quartz mill to be put in these mines early next summer by parties from this place, and it is said that San Francisco capital is being invested there this winter. The Cascade mountains, from the head of the Calapooia to the head of the Coast fork, are going to be more thoroughly prospected this coming summer than ever before, and the show for good ledges of gold and silver bearing quartz is favorable. The time is fast approaching for something to be done in this great mineral belt, and if our own people will not take hold of the matter and other enterprising men will, and we are not surprised to hear that Californians are preparing to take hold of what ought to belong to us.

With the completion of the narrow gauge to Portland, and the opening of a good wagon road up the Calapooia to tap this great body of timber and extensive mining district, we look for a boom here this coming year or in the near future.

FROM THE CAPITAL.

Death of an Aged Oregon Pioneer--Railroad Commission Blocked.

SPECIAL TO THE HERALD. SALEM, Feb. 6.--J. Quinn Thornton, a venerable pioneer, died at his home in this city at 11:40 last night.

J. Q. Thornton was supreme judge under the provisional government prior to 1849 and the organization of the territorial government. He was also a representative at Washington to gain assistance for the territory, and drafted the bill to organize the territory, and held many other important public positions. He was a man of large ability and liberal education and was active in shaping the early history of Oregon. He and his wife formed two of the greatest sufferers from being members of the immigrant party that left the old route and came to the Willamette Valley by what is termed the Joe Meek route.
