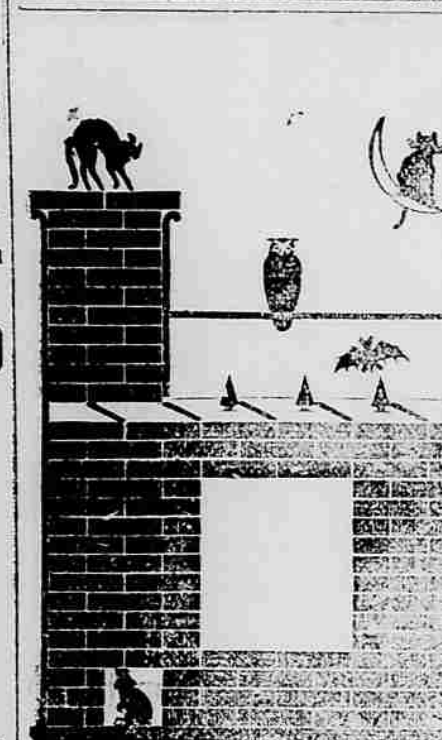

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TENACITY OF PURPOSE.

A Prize Essay Read Before Salem
Grange P. of H.

Of the many things which lead
to success in life, there is none to be
more highly commended, than ten-
acity of purpose. For instance,
we read that Cyrus W. Field
while engaged in laying the first
Atlantic cable, met with failure
twice while with great tenacity of
purpose, success crowned his
efforts on his third attempt. And
the submarine telegraph became a
fixed fact, and we have just cause
to rejoice that Cyrus W. Field was
possessed of sufficient tenacity of
purpose to bring his enterprise to a
successful termination.

Again we read, that Eli Whit-
ney was perfecting his cotton gin,
he had a machine nearly completed
when his workshop was broken in-
to and the machine stolen, and
this at a time when it required a
great amount of labor and pa-
tience, to construct one.

But nothing daunted with great
tenacity of purpose, he immedi-
ately started about making another
machine and the result was to give
a new life to the cotton industry
which had been languishing under
the old method of ginning the cot-
ton by hand, it being considered a
good days work for a hand to gin
a pound of cotton while after the
perfection of the cotton gin the
cotton growers soon found they had
the world for a market for their
cotton with a little judicious look-
ing after, and all the result of
Whitney's tenacity of purpose.

The history of Morse, Goodyear,
Howe, McCormick, and the thou-
sands of other inventors teaches us
that it is only tenacity of purpose
that any great public or private
enterprise can be made a success
so it is with the grange, being
founded on correct principles by
great tenacity of purpose of the
leaders of the order, it has grown
with amazing rapidity and it is
with just pride that very important
measures can be cited as the result
of the grange work.

It will be remembered when it
was first proposed to regulate the
railroads of the country. The idea
was hooted at but nothing daunted
with tenacity of purpose, the
grangers kept steadily after the ob-
ject sought for until finally the in-
terstate commerce law was passed as
the result of their agitation.

Again, to give an illustration of
grange work done right, here in
our own state nearly everyone can
remember when railroad fares
were about 10 cents per mile. But
thanks to the number of granges
that were called upon to serve in
the Legislature, we now enjoy the
more liberal Hout law, giving us
a four cent per mile rate; and this
might be still further reduced, with
profit to both the railroad company
and the people. But let grangers
not forget while considering the
question of fares, the unjust dis-
criminations made on different
trunk lines, the possibilities for use-
ful grange work are almost unlim-
ited.

Let us brother and sister grangers
improve every opportunity to
carry forward some plan that will
cause the people to rejoice, that the
grange brought into existence, to
grangers are delegated some of the
important questions that mankind
are called upon to consider—the
laws of our land for instance; to see
that they give equal justice to all
and are properly enforced.

This sometimes requires great
tenacity of purpose, but what may
ever arise let us each and everyone
strive to so conduct ourselves in
this life, when we may be called
to enter the grange above, the
master will say well done.

A Chicago Millionaire Murdered
for His Money.

ABOUT CANADIAN ANNEAUX.

Settlers in the Dominion Seeking Homes
in the United States—Missing Ves-

sels—Old World News.

CHICAGO, Feb. 8.—Amos J.
Snell, a millionaire, was found
murdered this morning at his resi-

dence 425 Washington boulevard.
About 2 o'clock the servant girl
heard a pistol shot coming from
Snell's room, but paid no atten-

tion to it. Later he was found
with a bullet hole in his breast
and one back of the ear. The mur-
derers had effected entrance by
sawing out a panel of the back

door. Snell was one of the largest
real estate owners in the city, and
all his business was transacted in
the basement of his own house in
which were several safes. The
theory in regard to the murder is
that a carefully planned robbery
had been arranged, as it was
known that during the first part of
each month large sums of money
proceeded from the rent of
Snell's houses, were kept in the
house. It is believed that the
burglars effected entrance to the
house and were at work at the
safes, when Snell heard the noise
and went down and surprised the
thieves.

COMMITTEE ON AGRICULTURE.

They Consider the Land Product of
This Great Country.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—The in-
quiry with regard to land and its
compounds by the senate commit-
tee on agriculture continued to-
day. Interested parties to the
number of 25 or 30, comprising
manufacturers' attorneys and ex-

perts were present. Samples of
the various compounds in tin pails
were produced, purchased in open
market, and chemically examined
by Prof. Sharper, of Boston, who
stuffed that samples bearing the
stamp of Armour & Co., pure re-

finer family lard, was found to con-
tain 60 per cent. hogs' lard with 20
per cent. each of cotton seed oil
and beef fat. Samples of Fair-
banks & Co.'s Chicago Prime re-

finer family lard was made of the
same elements, but had greater
proportions of beef fat and cotton
seed oil. Samples bearing the
stamp of Holstead & Co.'s pure
family lard, and another from the
same firm stamped Spanish pure
lard registered, etc., contained, so
far as tests have been carried, not
one particle of hog lard, but was
made entirely of beef fat and cot-

ton seed oil. In regard to cotton
seed oil the Professor said the
healthiness of the diet is a diet
which is a mooted question, it was
not a matter for chemists, but for
medical men to decide.

A CANADIAN GROWL.

A Movement of Settlers Toward the
United States.

WINNIPEG, Feb. 8.—The annual
report of Judge Ashdown was read
before the president of the board
of trade yesterday, fiercely attacks
the Canadian Pacific and the do-

minion government on the monop-

oly griping. It charges that the
liberal policy of the Canadian
Pacific has driven tens of thou-

sands of Canadian settlers
south to Dakota. In conclusion he
broadly intimated that the contin-

uation of the present policy of the
dominion government might re-

sult in a strong movement towards
annexation to the United States.

MISSING VESSELS.

Fears that Three Good Ships Have
Gone Down at Sea.

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 8.—Ship-

ping circles are greatly alarmed as
to the whereabouts of the British
steamers Darion, Lathra and Al-

getha. All three, each with a crew
of about twenty-five men, sailed
from Cardiff early in December for
Carthage to load with iron ore for
Philadelphia. No tidings have
since been heard from them, and
they are posted in Lloyds at Lon-

dou as missing.

Effe, mayor of this city, was in-

dicted by the grand jury last night
on a charge of embezzlement of
bank funds.

The Empress of Austria's Passion
for Horses.

The Empress Elizabeth is now
seldom seen in public. Her with-

drawal from public has its good
reason, as she is afflicted with a
rash on her face, which makes her
shun society. In Ischl, one of her
favorite summering places, when-

ever she appears on horseback her
face is concealed by a heavy veil,
and when she is driven out she has
the habit of always holding a fan
up to her face, even when return-

ing the greetings of her royal ad-
mirers. The wicked people of
Ischl say she does this because of
her affliction. However, it must
be said that when the imperial
lady is on horseback she has a very
beautiful, slender figure, and that
she rides in a wonderfully grace-
ful manner.

And no wonder, if all the stories
one hears are true. The people of
Vienna used to have a constant
grievance that the empress never
showed herself in public except
when Rezz's circus came to town,
and that then she was seen in her
box every night, while she never
attended the opera or the Burg
theatre. The empress' life in Vi-
