REMAINS FOUND.

The Body of Benjamin Olinck Found in the Willamette Below Buena Vista.

Information was received in this city yesterday that the body of Benjamin Olinck, who was drowned in the Willamette at Corvallis in December last, had been found in the river below Buena Vista. The body was of course in a stage of decomposition, but the parties by whom the remains were discovered were confident that they were those of the unfortunate young man. His brothers, who reside in Linn county between this city and Corvallis, were notified and have gone after the body.

It will be remembered that young Olinck, who was aged about sixteen, and was attending school at Corvallis, was hunting on the river in a boat, and that his hat was found near the ferry with the empty boat. Search was instituted and the river dragged, but the body could not be found, it having been washed down by the current.

The Oregon Pacific. A San Francisco dispatch of Feb. 7th says: Probably the directors of none of the many railroad lines that have intentions of becoming transcontinental are more sanguine of a speedy success than the Oregon Pacific people.

All the directors and nearly all the stockholders are Eastern men, yet there are no dissenters to the policy of pushing the line to a rapid completion. Just at this season there is a full in active outside work. Graders, construction gangs, and even surveyors are nearly all recalled for the present, for the heavy rains make it almost impossible to do any effective work; but a large force of workers is retained in readiness for the coming season, and the headquarters of the company at Corvallis presents the appearance of a hive of industry.

By April 1st it is expected to resume active construction work of the 500 miles of route from Yakima bay across the fertile interior of Oregon to Boise City. About 108 miles are to be built. The survey has been completed the entire distance. Grading has been done in sections amounting in all about 300 miles.

CHINESE LEGISLATION.

Senator John H. Mitchell's Remedy for Opium Smuggling on the Coast.

In an interview Senator Mitchell of Oregon, said: "I am informed from various sources that smuggling, especially of opium, has grown to an alarming extent on the Pacific slope. I have studied the subject carefully, and believe there is one way it can be prevented. It would suggest a reduction of the duty of \$10 a pound on opium, which was recognized as being for the purpose of really prohibiting its introduction into this country. Now it has not had that effect."

"At the present time there is more of the vile stuff smuggled into the United States than would come if the duty were, say \$3 per pound. The temptation to smugglers would be gone, yet the duty suggested would keep the price up high enough."

On last Saturday our town was considerably excited over the rumor that a genuine case of small pox was at hand, but on close examination it proved to be a false report.

Quite a number of farmers in the vicinity of Harrisburg are coming to Junction to mill. The time was when Junction was compelled to go to Harrisburg for milling purposes.

Democratic Central Committee. The meeting of the Linn county democratic central committee convened in this city Tuesday evening. There were present the following representation: W. R. Bilyeu, chairman; Geo. Humphrey, T. J. Cline of Albany, by J. J. Whitney proxy; F. A. Watts, of Shedd, by J. L. Hill proxy; T. J. Black, of Halsey, Enoch Hunt, of Harrisburg, by J. J. Whitney proxy; F. F. Croft, of Brownsville, by T. L. Wallace proxy; C. B. Montague, of Lebanon, F. M. Daniel, of Santiam, and J. M. Miller, of Syria, were also present.

The date of the primaries was fixed for March 17, and the county democratic convention in this city on March 24. The representation was based on the vote for N. L. Butler for congress in 1886 entitles 84 delegates from the several precincts to seats in the convention.

Thos. Nast. Thos. Nast, the great caricaturist, gave an exhibition and lecture at the opera house last night to a delighted audience. He showed just how short a step it was from the sublime to the ridiculous, and in his lecture, mingled with mirth and sentiment, kept the audience both interested and amused. He exhibited with his brush how simple and how are the strokes of the real artist required to put a public scene in an ugly cartoon, or to produce a painting of undoubted merit. Mr. Nast produced a caricature of Ben. Butler in half a minute, a painting of Niagara Falls in six minutes. Those who were in attendance will retain a most pleasant remembrance of this country's greatest artist. Mr. Nast was accompanied by his son and W. G. Steel of the Alpine club, Portland.

Railroad Commission. Senator Sater arrived in the city on yesterday morning's train, and the railroad commission began its regular monthly session. The first matter presented for the consideration of the board was regarding that inevitable heifer which was killed on the Oregon Pacific by a freight train, near Toledo, last fall. Jones, the owner, presented his claim to the company, which disallowed it. He then appealed to the commission, which has been investigating the merits of the case. It was decided that complainant was entitled to thirty dollars damages. In regard to the recent disaster on the O. & C. railroad, near Riddles, a formal entry was made on the record finding one to blame for the disaster. The commission leaves to-day for Clatsop Lane county, where it will make an examination of the narrow gauge railroad between that point and Brownsville, Linn county, complaints regarding the dangerous condition of the roadbed having been made by the citizens of Coquille and others. The commission will then return to Salem and resume its session.—Salem Statesman.
