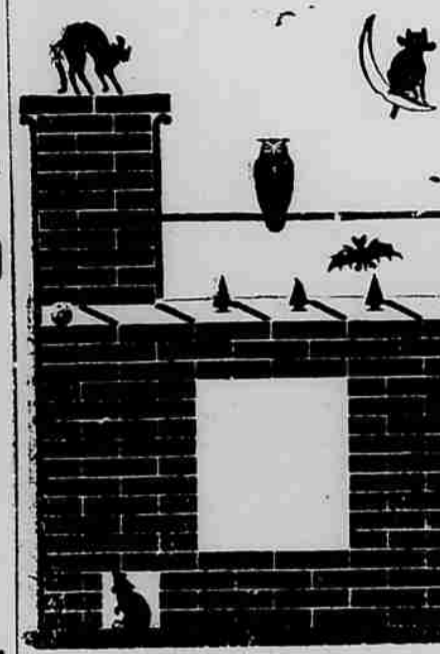

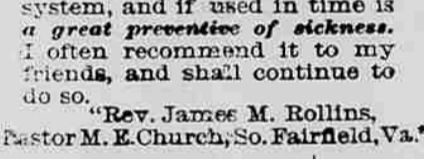

A BIG FRAUD.

An Arctic Sealer Proves to be a Smuggling Vessel.

AN INQUITOUS SCHEME EXPOSED

Several Prominent Men of San Francisco Implicated in Smuggling Opium into that Port—A Complete Exposure.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 11.—Two morning papers published a statement to the effect that the bark Halcyon, that was fitted out by parties in this city last spring, ostensibly for a sealing expedition in the Arctic waters and cleared from this port for that express purpose, but that in reality the vessel was intended for use in SMUGGLING OPIUM.

And has since been engaged in that occupation. It is claimed that the Halcyon obtained large quantities of opium from ports in British Columbia and brought it down to Drake's bay, where it was loaded on a smaller vessel and taken to San Francisco under cover of night. It is claimed that the Halcyon made several trips of this kind, and that hundred thousand dollars worth of opium was thus smuggled.

PROMINENT MEN IMPLICATED. The Examiner's account of the affair states that evidence is before Attorney-General Garland which implicates several prominent local politicians and one federal officer in a being connected with an organized effort to demand the government.

BITS OF HUMAN LIFE.

How It May Be Prolonged Beyond the Average Length.

I have before me the records of no less than fifty two centenarians, the details in regard to whom were collected by a committee of the British Medical association. Let us see whether an inquiry into these details suggest anything that as to what are, probably, the natural limits of human life, or as to the regimen by which life may be prolonged beyond its average length.

Of the fifty-two no fewer than thirty-six (more than two-thirds) are women. This may probably be attributed in large part to the comparative immunity that women enjoy from risks to which men are exposed, but probably it is due not less to their greater temperance and to their freedom from the anxieties and heartburnings which attend men's struggles for influence, and even manhood.

Medical men also possess, however, that woman has more greater inherent vitality than men the mortality of girls being less than that of boys, even during the first year of life, when the female is either more temperate nor less ambitious than the male, and is exposed to as many dangers.

Of the six men one only was single; ten of the thirty-six women were single; fifteen men and twenty-six women were married; but naturally enough, of these forty-one a large number, all in fact but five, were widowed. Three of the fifty-two were rich, nineteen poor, the rest in comfortable circumstances, nine were fat (only one man), twenty-three lean, eighteen moderate; only eight were full blooded; the average or pale. Forty had good digestion, which after 100 years means a good deal. Most of the fifty-two have had good appetites classed as actually bad, most of them have been through the moderate eaters; twelve, however, have eaten large quantities of food. Only one is returned as a large eater of flesh and blood, and only one as a great consumer of alcoholic liquors (in his case the liquor preferred has been beer). Only eight of all the number are classified as simply "irritable," but to these must be added five classed as "irritable and energetic."

Unfortunately, however, the inquiry have not in such matters as these been extended into the past. A man or woman may be very irritable in extreme old age, even may call 100 a good old age, even here when I am striving to show that it is the natural limit of life who has been very placid and even extremely amiable throughout the greater part of his or her career.

As to smoking, thirty-two are nonsmoking, seventeen smoke much (four of them are women), three moderately, and two a little; only one chews; thirty-seven avoid snuff. Most of the remaining returns, relating only to the actual condition of the fifty-two centenarians, at present, are of no special interest, showing only that the same weaknesses prevail in about the same degree among them, as many men and women of the average sort, between 70 and 80 years old. If only our fifty two centenarians could have been examined twenty years ago in these respects, the world might have obtained some useful hints. It is worthy of notice, however, that

most of them were free from rheumatic and gouty troubles. The only man whose joints were stiff and deformed from such causes stated, in reply to questions as to his capacity and taste for strong drink, "I always drank as much as I could, and I always will"—not a case, it will be observed, of "Willful will to water so Willful must wet," but of Willful would not to water and so wet his whistle to his own discomfort.—Richard A. Proctor in The Cosmopolitan.

KING MWANGA.

Frightened at Reports of the Approach of Stanley.

New York Sun. The savage ruler of Uganda, King Mwanga, who murdered Bishop Hannington and many of his Christian subjects a while ago, thought judgment was about to overtake him when he heard a while ago that Stanley was on the way to Central Africa. It will be remembered that before the King ordered the murder of Hannington he called his counselors around him, and the distinguished gentlemen discussed the probability that the whites would make them suffer if they put the Bishop to death. The strong point was raised that two white men had been killed a few years before by a chief at the south end of Victoria Nyanza, and the murderer had never been called to account for his crime. It was therefore inferred that Bishop Hannington could be murdered with impunity, and the unhappy man's fate was sealed.

But when the Arabs told Mwanga that Stanley was coming, his first thought was that the whites had been aroused to vengeance by the cruel taking off of Hannington. Had it been possible he would have turned pale when the Arabs told him the white man was coming with 1000 guns. He summoned in his hot hate the missionary Mackay, whom he had long held a prisoner. Mackay writes that there would have been a terrible panic if he had not succeeded in calming the fears of the King.

He told the despot that Stanley was coming to the relief of Emin Pasha, and he was not certain that he intended to visit Uganda at all. He could not have 1000 guns with him, because there were only 600 men in his party, most of whom were heavily laden with goods.

"Do you think," asked the King, "that Kaba Rega will let Stanley cross his country to Uganda?" "I don't know," answered Mackay, "but if he does, I am sure that Stanley will come here with peaceful intentions, if he comes at all."

Kaba Rega is Mwanga's powerful enemy, with whom he is frequently at war. His country lies between Emin Pasha's district and Uganda, the great country, which Mwanga misgoverns.

Another fear haunted the King. Suppose Stanley should come, it would not be pleasant to have Mackay accuse his dusky Highness of having forcibly detained him many months after he had asked permission to depart. He therefore upon decided that Mackay should not stay upon the order of his going, but go at once. He gave him scant time to pack his baggage and packed him off down the lake, and Mr. Mackay is now Europe after short visits to some of the mission stations on the way. Stanley hesitated to take the Uganda route to Central Africa, fearing that his approach might cause the King to put Mackay to death; but the news of his approach by another route had the good effect to set Mackay at liberty, and we shall probably soon hear from him full details of the stirring and tragical scenes he has witnessed in Uganda within the past two years. It was agreed when he left Uganda that another white man was to come to take his place, and before this the missionary, Gordon, has probably taken up the work Mackay left.

Fire and sword seemed impotent to extinguish Christianity in Uganda. Although Mwanga put about 200 Christians to death in the most cruel manner, the survivors never abjured their faith nor ceased to hold their secret meetings for worship. Since the King grew weary of persecutions the Christian natives have resumed holding meetings in his chief town, almost under the shadow of his royal hut.

A Female Murderer at Last Brought to Justice.

DEMOCRATIC TARIFF Muddle.

The Proposed Bill Will Not Receive Action by the Committee Before March—Old World Notes.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] BOSTON, Feb. 11.—The jury in the case of Mrs. Sarah Robinson rendered a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. In this trial she was charged with the murder of Prince Arthur Freeman, her nephew. Mrs. Robinson had previously been tried on a charge of murdering her son and daughter, but the jury disagreed. The incentive to all the crimes with which she was charged is alleged to be for the sake of obtaining the life insurance of her victims.

THE TARIFF Muddle.

Democrats Cannot Agree and Cannot Read Their Own Bill.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—A democrat who is a member of the house committee on ways and means stated this morning that it was improbable that the tariff bill could be laid before a full committee in time for action and report to the house before the first of March. The majority have struck a snag in the iron and steel schedule and are unable to agree upon the enlargement of the free list. Four or five articles have been placed on the free list and then taken out. The chairman of the committee has the only document that is regarded as the bill, and he states that he is unable to read it without the aid of his associates.

Blunt on Trial.

DUBLIN, Feb. 11.—The trial of Mr. Blunt, who was recently convicted for violating the crimes against the police, for \$25,000 damages for illegal arrest, was commenced today. Blunt was present in the court room, wearing his prison garb under his overcoat. Mr. Blunt was also present. The court room was crowded.

SAN REMO, Feb. 11.—The crown prince is doing as well as could be expected after undergoing the operation of tracheotomy.

Accepted the Position.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—Judge Alexander McCue, of Brooklyn, who at present holds the office of secretary of treasury, has been offered, and has accepted the position of assistant treasurer at New York, vice Canada resigned. McCue did not seek the office, and accepted it only upon the solicitation of the president.

The Great Walking Match.

New York, Feb. 11.—Fully 2000 people were in Madison Square garden this morning. At an early hour Albert came on the track, looking fresh after a four hour rest. He had 17 hours and 47 minutes to make the 65 miles necessary to the records. At 10 A. M. the score stood: Albert, 568; Henry, 549; Auerro, 534; Hart, 514.
