STATE NEWS.
Burglars Operating Successfully in Independence.
WATCHES AND JEWELRY STOLEN.
Willamette Valley Hop Growers' Association Organized—Other News from the State Capital.

SALEM, Feb. 16.—The store of Henry Peterson at Independence was entered by burglars last night and \$800 in watches, rings and jewelry taken. The robbery was not discovered until morning, when vigorous measures for the capture of the thieves were instituted, but so far without success.

CRATER LAKE.
Prof Powell Enthusiastic in Advocacy of the Proposed Park.
WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—J. W. Powell, director of the U. S. geological survey, indorses emphatically the plan proposed by Senator Dolph and Representative Herndon to create a public park at Crater and Diamond lakes in Oregon. Powell is chairman of the committee on public lands, interested in the plan.

GENERAL NEWS.
A Bold Bank Robbery Committed in a Texas Town.
GRAVE CHARGES AGAINST GOLD
Providencia Rhode Island, swept by a Disastrous Fire—Half a Million Converted to Ashes.

CISCO, Tex., Feb. 16.—A bold bank robbery occurred here yesterday afternoon. The cashier and two others connected with the bank were in the bank when a man appeared at the cashier's window and demanded the bank's cash. Three other men appeared at the same time and took the first collected the funds, amounting to about \$6000 in cash. The robbers locked the bankers in the yard back of the bank building, and jumping into a wagon fled down the street, saluting the astonished people with volleys from their revolvers and displaying their bags of ill-gotten gains. In a short time the marshal with a posse were in pursuit.
A BIG BLAZE.
PROVIDENCIA, Feb. 16.—The most disastrous fire which has visited this city since 1877, when the wholesale buildings about the post-office were destroyed, raged early this morning about the business blocks near the city hall. The fire originated in Chase's block, corner of Eddie and Fountain streets and spread thence to Billing's block, and thence to the Alldrich house, Allen's carriage repository, and finally to the Exchange hotel. To-day the whole square is a mass of smoking ruins. All the guests in the hotel escaped but saved very little property. Total loss is estimated at from \$500,000 to 700,000.
TROUBLE IN INDIAN TERRITORY
Colored Troops and Settlers Engage in a Fight.
WITCHITA (Kas.), Feb. 16.—A special says that fresh ejections from Oklahoma have taken place at the hands of a company of colored troops, who are said to have handled the settlers in anything but a genteel manner. The prisoners in the part were taken to Fort Reno, and there in most part they were turned loose, though some were held for trial at the next term of the criminal court. Reinforcements have been asked for, and two companies passed through here to-day en route for Fort Reno.
GOLD IN TROUBLE.
The Grand Jury Investigating Charges Against Him.
New York, Feb. 16.—The charges against Jay Gould and Russell Sage, made on behalf of stockholders of the Kansas Pacific railroad company, of appropriating to their own use \$3,000,000 of the company's bonds, was laid before the grand jury this morning. The jury was given all the documents bearing on the case, and on Monday the witnesses will be summoned.

IMITATION DIAMONDS.
Clever Deceptions to Please the Public Eye.

"What a brilliant diamond!"
"Yes."
"Why, one could almost see to read in the dark by its rays," said a reporter for the Mail and Express recently to a downtown jeweler.
"Think so," he replied. "Well, it does look rather fine. How much do you think it is worth?"
"One thousand dollars?"
"Is that all?"
"Well, make it \$2000 or \$2500, or possibly \$3000."
"I'll sell it to you for \$10."
"Why so generous?"
"There's no generosity about that. Most buyers would not give more than \$5 for it."
"Why not?"
"Because it is not a real stone. They come from Oberstein, in Germany. The entire town is supported by the manufacture of such gems. How are they fixed up? In various ways.
