## PACIFIC COAST.

The Irrepressible Bennewitz Again Breaks Jail in Polk County.

SMALLPOX QUARANTINE AT FRISCO

The Steamer Salisbury from Port Townsend Reported Lost at Sea—The Crew Saved.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] SALEM, Feb. 17.—Bennewitz, the irrepressible Dutchman, who has been in Polk county jail less than a week and escaped Tuesday, again effected an escape Wednesday night, and took to the woods with his shackles on. He was tracked up but at last accounts he still had the bulge on the officers.

SMALLPOX IN FRISCO.

The Steamer City of Peking Placed in Quarantine.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—The steamer City of Peking, arrived from China and Japan this morning with one case of smallpox on board, and placed in quarantine. Smallpox is prevalent to a considerable extent in Hong Kong, but is not regarded yet as an epidemic. A great drought in the north of China, which is having the good effect of facilitating the repairs of the destruction caused by the Yellow river inundations.

Schooner Reported Lost.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 17.—It is reported that the merchants' exchange that the schooner Salisbury from Port Townsend to Monte Video, was abandoned at sea. The crew were saved.

A GREAT BILL.

McCollects \$500 and Leaves With It for Oregon.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 16.—A jilted young man, who gave the name of J. W. Lord, applied for and received rooms at a hotel in Oakland some weeks ago, for himself and wife. He said he was canvassing Oakland for orders for a lithographing house of St. Paul, Minn. His success must have been good, for he received several orders upon which a deposit was required. In this way he collected over \$500. When his bill became due, the proprietor of the hotel knocked at Lord's door, expecting to get his money, but he soon discovered that the place was vacant. Next day the hotel man heard from Lord, on his way to Oregon, but that is the last of him. It is thought that he is a professional bilk, and those who have given him money on orders for lithographing will be losers, as well as the proprietor of the hotel.

NOTED GUILTY.

Brook Corbett, the Notorious Train Robber, Killed in Texas.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Feb. 16.—Deputy Sheriff Alfred Allice on Tuesday killed Brook Corbett, the notorious train robber, near Pearland. Corbett was the leader of the gang of highwaymen that committed the Southern Pacific train robbery, near Lantonia, last June, the McNeil robbery, on the International, and the notable Bee Brook robbery, near Fort Worth, on the Texas Pacific. Corbett and his gang secured nearly \$100,000 worth of booty in these train robberies.

Rewards aggregating \$5000 were outstanding for Corbett's capture, \$2000 being offered by the railroad and express companies, \$1000 for the murderer of Gus Lewis, a wealthy cattle man, of Atacosa county, \$1000 for the murder and robbery of a wealthy Mexican in Duval county, \$500 for killing Deputy Sheriff Stanley, of Williams county, and \$500 for killing a member of a Sheriff's posse in Bee county.

IN CASTLE GARDEN.

How the Employes Learn to Speak Foreign Languages.

Sometimes there is a good deal of amusement at Castle Garden by reason of the confusion of languages among the immigrants. Some of the ordinary questions asked closely resemble some English phrase, and when Superintendent Jackson is in a hurry he sometimes hears a question often repeated which sounds like:

"Has Jackson got cher watch?"

It was only a Slavonian interpreter asking some newly arrived persons their names, the phrase for which in that tongue is: "Jak sen usbur wasch?"

One of the brightest clerks in the rotunda is a little Irishman, and he bids fair to become a thorough all-around linguist. When he can spare the time he endeavors to increase his conversational vocabulary by listening to the ordinary inquiries that the interpreters make of the immigrants and catching a word here and there. When an

interpreter was talking to a recent arrival of Arabs this clerk overheard what appeared to be, so far as he could understand, "shamrock."

He decided to experiment with the word upon another Arab. He gave him the pencil and paper and asked, "Shamrock?" The man complied with the request and immediately wrote down "32," signifying that he was 32 years of age. When he wants to ask an Arab how old he is, after this, that clerk will say "Shamrock." Another phrase used by the same interpreter struck the Irish ear as being "McManus." Experimenting in the same manner upon another Arab, the clerk was as successful as before, the man addressed standing up and pointing to his wife with sundry ceremonies of introduction, to signify that he married, as he had understood the question. He has caught a few other expressions in different languages, which, though they may not sound very elegant in English, answer his purpose in eliciting the desired information. "Dirt under your toe," for instance, signifies to some immigrants "Where are you going?" and "Spit it out," means "Sign your name."

LAND JUMPERS "BOUNCED."

SALT LAKE CITY AGAIN IN POSSESSION OF HER PARKS.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Feb. 16.—To-day Mayor Armstrong, with the chief of police and sixty regular and special policemen, went to Arsenal hill, the scene of the land-jumping, and ordered the trespassers off warning them that the land was claimed by the city. The jumpers did not go, whereupon the mayor ordered his force to "bounce them" and tear down their shanties, tents and fences, which was promptly done, and a guard left to prevent the jumpers returning. This was done also on the Tenth-ward square, which had been jumped by Alma Winn. The police hold possession all along the line. The jumpers say they will ask help of the United States marshal. The action of the mayor is taken in pursuance of a resolution adopted in a secret meeting of the city council last night.

ANOTHER COWARDLY MOVE.

England Steals the Richest Part of Venezuela.

NEW YORK, Feb. 16.—General Francisco A. DeSilva, Consul to this city, from the republic of Venezuela, is in receipt of information that England within the last few days has taken possession by armed forces, of the most valuable portion of the Territory of Venezuela.

The territory is not in dispute between the two countries, and to which England has no claim, and in doing so, has directly violated the Monroe doctrine of the United States.

General De-Silva will call on the authorities at Washington for prompt enforcement of the Monroe doctrine.

The seizure was made through Governor Charles Bruce, of Demerara. The territory seized includes the richest gold mines of South America. DeSilva said that in it are fourteen mines, the average production of each of which is \$300,000 a year.

He says that if the United States does not interfere the Venezuelans will fight for the territory.

Records that Went to Halifax.

It has not long been known that the evacuation of Boston by the British troops in March, 1776, many of the royalist inhabitants of the city departed with them. The fleet conveying the troops and the fleeing civilians proceeded to Halifax, where many of the royalists took up their abode and where many of their descendants are to be found at the present day. It is also a matter of general belief that these fleeing Tories took with them many valuable records. It is not however, generally known that these missing records include all the papers of the Boston Custom House, from the time of its establishment to the time of its evacuation. Among the papers were the records of the arrival of many of the vessels which brought the early settlers of the colony, and doubtless included much which at the present day would be of the greatest value as historical material. It is credibly reported that many of these documents are still in existence in the possession of the authorities of Halifax. ## GENERAL NEWS.

A Fiendish Attempt to Murder Officials in Dublin.

TERRIFIC GUNPOWDER EXPLOSION

President Cleveland and Party Will Make a Tour to Florida—The Reading Strike—Old World Notes.

The Herald's Special Dispatches.] DUBLIN, Feb. 17.—A package containing gunpowder, to which was attached a leaden ball, was thrown in the house of Inspector Kelly, at Skibberton this morning. An explosion followed wrecking the furniture and filling the house with choking fumes from which the inmates barely escaped with their lives. The windows in the house of Mackay, crown solicitor for the county, were smashed by an unknown person Wednesday evening. Mackay was in Falcarrack at the time of the outrage prosecuting the case against Father Stephens, convicted of inciting the tenants not to pay their rents.

The Reading Strike.

SCRANTON (Penn.), Feb. 17.—Owing to Powderly's illness the executive committee this week came here to confer with him on the Reading strike situation. Master Workman Lewis called on Powderly last night, and it is probably from reports of the interview that have leaked out that the miners strike will at once be declared off.

Statement Denied.

BERLIN, Feb. 17.—The North German Gazette, a Bismarck organ, denies the statement made by the Freisinger yesterday, that a bill will be introduced into the reichstag providing for the appointment of a representative of the crown prince in the event of his being summoned to act as regent.

The Crown Prince Improving.

SAN REMO, Feb. 17.—The crown prince had a good night's sleep, free from headache or fever. He will rise to day, but will remain in his room.

LATER.—A noon bulletin says that the wound in the crown prince's larynx is beginning to heal. Expecting and coughing continues.

The President Going to Florida.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—The president and Mrs. Cleveland will leave Washington for Florida next Tuesday and expect to be back by Saturday. They will be accompanied by Secretary and Mrs. Whitney and Colonel and Mrs. Lamont.

Restrictive Fire.

WESTERLY, R. I.—A destructive fire raged here early this morning, causing a loss of \$15,000. The thermometer marked 34 degrees below zero, causing severe suffering to firemen.
